Re: WEEKLY INFORMATION UPDATE

Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We have a full agenda Tuesday night. The meeting begins with a proclamation recognizing the service of Pam and Gene Holder with the Lower Valley Fire District. Following the proclamation will be a presentation by the Colorado Riverfront Commission's rebranding efforts and the auditors will present the 2016 Audit Presentation. Organizers of the recent Community Dinner will be at the meeting to thank Council for support. We have a full consent agenda and my annual review also slated on the agenda.

TID BITS:

- At the recent annual CIRSA meeting, the City was recognized with 13 other jurisdictions throughout Colorado with a Worker's Compensation safety award—great job to city staff for taking safety seriously and for HR Director Odette Brach for coordinating efforts!
- The positive sales tax revenue trend continues with May revenues being 12.43% over May of 2016, leaving 2017, 8.57% over 2016 through May.
- Mesa County Federal Mineral Lease District approved our grant extension request through August 30, 2017, to complete the final pieces of the Downtown Utility and Streetscapes Improvement design.
- It has been a busy week meeting with business prospects. We began negotiating a contract with one prospect that we hope to bring to Council in August. We furthered conversations with another prospect and began talking with two new prospects in the bike industry, one that came to meet with us after seeing us at Eurobike.
- I continue to reach out and meet with developers who are currently working through our process or have in recent years. These are resulting in very productive feedback for ways to improve or refine our process.

Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

- The leadership team participated in a training this week to begin cleaning up data, making changes to and improving the new priority based budgeting tool.
- State Representative and candidate for State Treasurer Polly Lawrence stopped by to meet with some of us this week.
- We are exploring the possibility of joining a solar cooperative with some of our facilities through an XCEL Energy opportunity.
- We are also exploring a new possibility to study in rolling out fiber throughout the City.
- The remaining core behavior kick-off meetings were completed this week covering all staff at this point.
- As a result of the CTO hosting the writers from Gear Patrol, who the Mayor and I met with during their trip to Fruita, they covered the Western Slope by writing a nearly 50-page feature in their <u>American Issue</u>, <u>Issue 4</u>.
- The CTO also launched a Colorado Outdoor Adventure Blog: http://blog.colorado.com/.
- The contractor for the I-70 force main work near the business park is nearly complete, and will return in a couple weeks to make the final connections.
- We are working to begin requesting bids for the Kokopelli section of the Riverfront Trail in early August.
- BLM completed their studies for this trail and found no significant impact.
- Staff is working on design of the concept plan for the Highway 6 East sewer project.
- Staff is drafting the grant application for the same project.
- Aspen Village subdivision began laying concrete this week.
- We received a submittal for over 270 homes for the Iron Wheel subdivision that is looking to go to Planning Commission in August.
- Staff has been in communication with Tesla Motors regarding their program to install charging stations in the City and will continue to evaluate.
- Unfortunately a triathlon event that was scheduled this week at Snooks Bottom had to be cancelled due to the inability to have onsite open water lifeguards.
- E.coli testing prior to this event at Snooks were the lowest ever, showing no issues.
- Departments participated in numerous safety trainings this week provided by CIRSA onsite.
- Public Works staff began communications with CDOT regarding the snipes on the billboard.
- HR is still busy with multiple hiring processes. We have openings of an Aquatics Supervisor, Police Officer, Recreation Programs Supervisor, Maintenance Worker and Wastewater Operator.
- We will miss current Recreation Programs Supervisor Bree Hare who will be helping out with some part time work and wish her well with her new opportunity!
- Unfortunately, True Value had a burglary, but Fruita PD was able to coordinate with authorities in Utah and the suspect is in custody.
- The kids slide was reinstalled at the Community Center this week.
- Maintenance week is scheduled for the third week in September this year.

- Two townhome projects passed at Planning Commission.
- A new restaurant, Mi Ranchito Taco Shop opened this week at the former Thai Restaurant near Judy's.
