### **Certified Small Business Community**

We received word that we made it to the final round of the Certified Small Business Community grant application through the Office of Economic Development & International Trade's Blueprint 2.0 program. Jon Maraschin, Business Incubator, and I will present to the state next week before they make their final selection. We requested \$30,000 over a three-year period to transition the BIC space in the Civic Center to a co-working space managed by the BIC.

### **Annual HOA Meeting & Cities and Towns Week**

Annually, our Code Compliance Officer, Mark Angelo, conducts training with HOA members throughout the City. During the year, we have added topics of interest for this annual meeting and decided to broaden this meeting to include a series of informational sessions that people can choose from during the state's Cities and Towns Week, September 11-17. The City Link arriving to residents by the end of August will highlight this and detailed info on each session will be posted on the website. Rather than one meeting, we will have different presentations each day covering topics such as marijuana, animal control issues, general crime prevention, code compliance, texting and young teens, vacation rentals by owners, irrigation water, Communities that Care, among others being developed. Presentations will be most nights between 6-8 pm.

- We are requesting quotes from various health insurance providers for 2018.
- Planning Commission will be reviewing the Iron Wheel re-submittal on Tuesday.
- There have only been 18 new dwelling unit permits issued year to date, but many on the horizon.
- The new Aspen Village Subdivision paving is complete.
- The new phase at Brandon Estates should be paving next week.
- The utility relocation for the Aspen alley project begins next week.
- The eastern Kokopelli section of the Riverfront Trail request for construction bids is advertised on August 6 with a bid opening August 30.
- Our Engineering intern Rachel completes her internship with us and we appreciate her hard work on a large list of projects—she was able to stay busy as our Engineering Division is carrying a large load of projects this year.

- Police have shared education information on their Facebook page related to increased sightings
  of bears in the area—Parks and Wildlife typically respond to any calls for service relating to
  bears that may be causing trouble.
- The Sheriff's Department shared with us that they have had a lot of calls for service at Enoch's Lake and are working with Public Works.
- Staff is working on a draft updated agreement with the Glade Park Water Users Association that will increase their level of maintenance of the water line that serves them and reduce staff time and resources.
- Annual street striping will occur next week throughout the City.
- Public Works was able to hire a new Maintenance Worker to start in the next couple weeks.
- Hiring continues for a Police Officer, Seasonal Public Works employee, Aquatics Supervisor,
   Recreation Programs Supervisor and Wastewater Treatment Operator.
- Crews began work on the ramp and clearing for the temporary overflow parking at Little Salt Wash Park (southwest of the current lot).
- We now have the ability to remotely monitor our I-70 lift station.
- Building Maintenance is conducting an inspection of the maintenance of the Dinosaur Journey building the City owns.
- The Community Center remains very busy with 21,316 paid visits in July and 124,147 in 2017 thru July—this is 3,797 over 2016 for the same period.
- Unfortunately, another compressor went out at the Community Center to be repaired.
- Parks crews are busy with grub beetle control and tree trimming.


