City offices will be closed Monday, Jan. 1 in observance of New Year's Day and trash and recycling services will be delayed one day next week.

# THURSDAY's Re-scheduled City Council Meeting & Special City Council Workshop

Reminder that Thursday, Jan. 4 we will have a short, regular City Council meeting at 7 pm to act on consent agenda items before adjourning and then holding a special Council Workshop to continue the Density Bonus discussion.

## **TID BITS:**

- The last week of the year was filled with a handful of maintenance issues. A pump motor at the I-70 Lift Station overheated and burned up on Friday prior to the Christmas weekend. The lift station continued to operate on secondary pumps for a week while the motor could be rebuilt.
- A non-potable water line at the WWRF broke on Christmas Eve under the
  parking lot. Crews were able to shut down the water line and having been using
  potable (more expensive) water in the headworks building until repairs can be
  completed next week.
- The FCC was busy with not only patron visits but maintenance issues as well. Friday before Christmas a pipe failed leading into the main pool heater. Water flow was routed around the pool heater and the pool was not heated. However, air temperature in the natatorium was increased to minimize heat loss in the pool water. Water temperature went to a low of 83 degrees before temporary repairs were made on Tuesday after Christmas.
- In addition, a ventilation pipe fell from the ceiling of the natatorium onto the pool deck. This pipe was secured by metal clamps that had rusted and failed after 7 years in the corrosive pool environment. Staff has inspected all other pipe brackets and found this was the only pipe secured in such a manner.

- The final unplanned maintenance issue of the year (knock on wood for next two days) included having the telephones and RecTrac down on Tuesday morning due to a routing switch that failed at the FCC. The switch was restarted by ProVelocity and we'll be watching the switch in the future.
- Pine Street was closed this week (as planned) for crosswalk safety improvements at the Pabor Avenue intersection. The crosswalk was relocated to the north side of Pabor Avenue where a pedestrian refuge island was installed and the road will be reopened prior to kids returning to school.
- FCC monthly billing for December was down by approximately \$750 from November; however, we are within \$7 dollars from the billing in December 2016. We have seen fluctuations in monthly billing by this amount before. We will watch and wait to see what the FCC rate increase does to billing in January.
- Youth Basketball and Volleyball rosters are filling up nicely. Looks like another full season of sports is about to start. Tom C. is training another cohort of lifeguards over the winter break.
- The Adventure Cycling Association released an article for their upcoming publication about cycling in Colorado that highlights some of the western slope destinations (article below).
- The City finished off the year with a total of 46 new housing starts in 2017 and is seeing indications of a continued rise in development going into 2018.
- Munchies submitted an application this week to construct a new building on Kokopelli Blvd. to relocate their restaurant.
- Fruita resident, Roger Tonozzi, let staff know this week that he now has over 11,000 miles on his
  electric wheelchair and he would like to extend thanks to the City of Fruita for all of the
  sidewalks and trails around town.

→ ONE OF THE most gratifying parts of my job is helping states and localities become premier cycle tourism destinations. Such was the case this fall when Colorado's tourism division brought me down to the Front Range and Western Slope to speak at their annual tourism conference, meet with officials, and enjoy some superb cycling on pavement and dirt.

Colorado is already a great riding destination, but it's exciting to see how it has explicitly decided to become the very best cycling state in America. National experts currently consider Washington State to have the best overall conditions for cyclists, but Colorado is moving up the ranks thanks in part to the strong support of Governor John Hickenlooper, who pledged a \$100 million package of infrastructure investments for safer, more enjoyable cycling. State agencies are also investing in the "Colorado 16" a series of 16 major trail projects to link cities and parks in all parts of Colorado.

While there, I shared "best practices" for bike tourism with state leaders and met with the staff at Bicycle Colorado – one of the best cycling advocacy groups in the U.S. — on how we can designate and map official U.S. Bicycle Routes to bring more cyclists to rural communities.

Best of all, I got to meet with local volunteers who often take the lead in creating local trails and route networks. My favorite "Sherpa" had to be Chris Muhr, who owns a metal fabrication business in Grand Junction but spends countless hours designing and building world-class mountain bike trails in western Colorado.

I spent 10 days in the state, and what blew me away was the incredible variety of cycling experiences. Cool, uninterrupted urban trails crisscross Denver, Boulder, Fort Collins, Grand Junction, and other cities. The "Colorado 16" initiative is closing the gaps between these cities and creating easy access to the Rockies, mesas, and other spectacular natural areas.

On the paved side, I enjoyed a beautiful loop around Horsetooth Reservoir and downtown Fort Collins all from the front door of Jerry French, an Adventure Cycling Life Member. One of the most memorable rides of my life was a loop through the truly breathtaking (for its beauty and its steepness) Colorado National Monument. I was able to do the low-traffic, 40-mile ride right from downtown Grand Junction. In fact, it was so awesome I changed my schedule to do it again in the reverse direction.

On the dirt side, it was a true cornucopia. Muhr took me to the towns of Fruita and Ridgeway, once struggling spots now revived by incredible mountain bike trails. Of special note is the Kokopelli Trail, a rugged 150-mile link between Fruita and Moab, Utah. Muhr and his compadres have also built the Kokopelli Loops, a mix of shorter trails that attract riders of all abilities from all over the world. When I was

there, the cottonwoods and aspens were flaming gold, which only added to the riding excitement on dirt and slickrock.

If you are curious about Colorado, check out the resources below. Adventure Cycling has increased our tour offerings in the state, from an easy tour on paved paths in Colorado Ski Country to inn-to-inn rides over red rock terrain and in the San Juan Mountains. However you do it, make sure you set your sights on Colorado — great things are happening as it aims to become the top bike travel destination in America.
