The City has 2 candidates for the Mayor's seat - Joel Kincaid and Mike Durden, and 5 candidates for the 3 Council seats – Kyle Harvey, Rudy Van Voorhees, Carolyn Gambino, Karen Leonhart and Lori Buck. The candidates' bios are on the City's website and will also be included in the next issue of the City Link. The Chamber is hosting a candidate forum on March 8 at 6 pm at the Community Center.

- This was a busy week, and a week of partner meetings.
- We enjoyed hosting BLM staff from the local, state and federal office in Fruita Wednesday. Local businesses joined us as well and we highlighted the partnerships Fruita has with the BLM while hiking in the National Conservation Area.

- We also met with the hospital to begin conversations related to future growth and joint needs.
- We met with our trail partners to discuss an April event to raise money for trails in partnership with local businesses, COPMOBA and a screening of a new premier movie, The Moment.
- I had a chance to meet with the Chief of Lower Valley Fire District to coordinate efforts as well.
- Progress is being made on updating our Economic Development landing page on the website as well.
- Planning staff are coordinating the parking study that is being completed by Greg Moberg for the downtown area.
- We met with the Chamber's Governmental Affairs Committee and updated them on the TABOR ballot measure and opportunity to provide comments to the USDA regarding Fruita's standing in their Residential Funding Programs. GJEP, the Business Incubator and the City have sent in comments to USDA and others are preparing comments as well.
- We also met with GJEP this week to coordinate economic development efforts, prospective businesses we are working together on and to schedule a site visit for this weekend.
- We hosted the municipality dinner with guests from the County, GJ, Palisade, Collbran, DeBeque, District 51 and the Regional Airport Monday.
- Planning Commission heard the Chapter 8 Land Use Code Amendment for Density Bonuses
 Tuesday and recommended approval with no changes, so it will be coming for first reading to
 City Council on March 6.
- The bridge for the Kokopelli section of the Riverfront Trail is scheduled to be installed Tuesday.
- Lt. Peck and Chief Krouse attended the Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police mid-year conference in Greeley.
- Corporal Young and Officer Bomar gave an internet/social media safety presentation for students and parents that was well received.
- Precision Concrete Cutting gave a demonstration this week to City of Grand Junction and City of
 Fruita employees. This might be a solution to full replacements that cost more and other
 grinding methods that leave an unattractive rough finish.
- The FCC gymnasium was transformed on Saturday evening into a formal event area for the Fruita Chamber of Commerce Annual Banquet. A great time was had by all who attended.
- The Annual Sweetheart Run is this coming Saturday and will be hosted at the FCC.

- The Arts and Culture Board is plotting and planning and getting everything ready for the third annual Evening of Art Gala. The event will be held on Saturday, March 10th at the Fruita Community Center. Tickets are on sale at the FCC and City Market. Funds raised will go towards future artwork in the round-a-bouts on Highway 340 and at I-70 a much needed cause!
- Recreation staff is busily planning the 3rd Annual Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament. Attached is the sponsorship/registration form. If you know of anyone who may be interested in either sponsoring or playing in the tournament, please pass it on. The tournament has raised \$6,000 each of the first two years. These funds have paid for youth to access the Fruita Community Center or to help pay for registration fees for swim lessons, soccer, basketball, or many other program offerings. The Fruita Rotary Club is the Title sponsor and Family Health West is the Food sponsor. The tournament will be held on Friday, April 6th. (See form below)
- Parks is continuing to take advantage of the nice weather. This past week, staff has removed and is rebuilding the horseshoe pits at Reed Park. They have also been working on cleaning up and adding crushed granite to the exercise areas at Olga Anson Park.
- Fruita Little League coordination is starting up. Staff meets with the new FLL Director and is planning for another great season.
- Crews will be out tomorrow, Feb 17 flagging for singletrack trail along the new trail.
