The meeting begins with a presentation to the City from AARP State Director, Bob Murphy of the Age-Friendly Community certificate. We also have the second reading and public hearing of adopting a new land use chapter on Bonus Density.

April 3, 2018 Election Update (cont.)

Mail-in ballots were received by residents the week of Monday, March 12. Election News: http://www.fruita.org/citycouncil/page/2018-regular-municipal-election. The City has 2 candidates for the Mayor's seat - Joel Kincaid and Mike Durden, and 5 candidates for the 3 Council seats — Kyle Harvey, Rudy Van Voorhees, Carolyn Gambino, Karen Leonhart and Lori Buck. The candidates' bios are on the City's website and were included in the Spring issue of the City Link. The Chamber hosted a candidate forum on March 8 at 6 pm at the Community Center that was attended by 50-60 people and the theme of the night was very positive. Drop boxes are open in the Civic Center parking lot as well as in the Civic Center. Ballots must be received via mail or by drop off by 7pm on Election Day, April 3, 2018. The City has received over 1,700 ballots.

3rd Annual Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament

Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

On Friday, April 6th, Fruita Parks and Recreation is hosting its third annual Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament at Adobe Creek National Golf Course. The tournament is a fundraiser for the Youth Scholarship Fund and has raised \$12,000 over the past two years. These funds are used to pay the fees for Fruita's youth who cannot afford to participate in programs like swimming lessons, soccer, flag football, basketball, etc. In addition, each of the five local Fruita Schools receive 10 summer passes to the Fruita Community Center which they hand out to youth who they feel may need a place to hang out over the summer. This is a great tournament and is for a great cause. The Fruita Rotary Club is the Title sponsor for this event and Family Health West is the Food Sponsor. TID BITS:

- F-Works Co-working space in the Civic Center is nearing completion with a grand opening being planned by the Business Incubator center for mid-late April.
- It's hiring season in Parks and Recreation! Parks is interviewing this week to fill three seasonal park maintenance worker positions. The FCC also interviewed to fill a day-time custodian position and they just hired nine new lifeguards (they will be hiring even more lifeguards as the summer is just around the corner).
- COPMOBA will be hosting a Bike Swap and movie night on Saturday, April 28th in Civic Center Park. The bike swap will be from Noon 6 pm with live music and beer. They will then transition the park to show the movie 'The Moment' which is about the origins of mountain biking. COPMOBA will also be fundraising throughout the day for trail development—specially the remaining three miles of trail that is ready to be built in the Kokopelli Trail system (the Hawkeye Trail was open last year as part of this phased project.)
- Wednesday afternoon 7,000 Easter eggs were scooped up by Fruita youth under 7 years old in record time on the back lawn of the Community Center.
- Highway 6 Sewer Interceptor Working with CDOT on utility crossing permit.
- Kokopelli Section of the Riverfront Trail Phase I Waiting on United to finish their outlet structure flume, backfill and grading to complete the fencing.
- Kokopelli Phase II Trail Soil Nail Wall construction continues.
- Grant presentation for AGNC scheduled for April 25th at 2:00 pm. We are asking \$9,000 for the Gateway Enhancement Roundabouts.
- Regarding our \$50,000 grant request from the Mesa County Federal Mineral Lease District for the Cedar Way Infrastructure Improvements, we should find out regarding a possible award on April 18.
- Engineering is seeking two possible grant processes for a summer intern.
- Starbucks is working towards a May opening.
- Next week, Parks and Public Works are going to locate and fix a water leak in the irrigation line
 on the east side of Suds Brothers. There should only be 2-24"x24" concrete stones removed
 initially to locate the leak.
- Public Works has been busy:
 - · Produced 30 cubic yards of biosolids for fertilizer that has already been used.
 - · Spring cleaning the irrigation pond at Little Salt Wash Park and storm drains.
 - · Crews will be crack-sealing along Pine Street, Vitners Farm and Wildwood subdivisions.

- Grand Valley Irrigation is opening their irrigation gates this weekend, so crews are preparing the irrigation system for start-up April 16.
- · In one day, the road crew hauled 207 tons of rock chips for chip sealing—when finished they will have hauled 1,974 tons.
- Staff and local businesses hosted and presented to high school students from FMHS, Palisade, GJ, and Central this week for Career Exploration Day.
- Staff met with some of the downtown businesses to talk trash and sprucing up the North Aspen Alley.
- The Mayor and I had a great meeting with Robin Brown, GJEP.
- We continue to meet with prospective developers and Planning/Engineering staff are busy with multiple reviews.
- Have a great weekend and Happy Easter!


