Emergency Response to School Lockdowns

Once again I applaud the Fruita Police Department and also all other local agencies in their partnership and swift response to a report that was taken very seriously to protect students at Fruita schools on Wednesday. Fortunately, all were safe and the report turned out to be unsubstantiated, but we know that those involved went through something very real during those hours and I am proud to see how well the Police Department, School District and partner agencies responded and coordinated with each other. My heart goes out to the students, teachers/staff and parents during those hours and I appreciate their patience and support. Below is the timeline the agencies jointly released to the media Wednesday:

- At 8:20 a.m. Fruita Police received a report about a man possibly pointing a gun at someone at the Maverick Gas Station. The initial report says the suspect was seen walking toward the high school. Given the incident was alleged to have taken place in close proximity to schools, both Fruita Monument High School and Fruita 8/9 were put on shelter-in-place as a precaution.
- At 8:36 a.m. law enforcement received a Safe2Tell tip about a possible threat to Fruita Monument High School. Law Enforcement was already on scene because of the shelter-in-place and did not see or hear anything that would indicate a possible shooter or a threat to the school. Still, both 8/9 and the High School were placed on lockdown as a precaution.
- Law enforcement went in both schools and checked every classroom to verify there was no threat to the school.
- While law enforcement officers where ensuring the safety of students, the investigation into the initial incident at the Maverick continued. The Fruita Police Department learned, after speaking with a young juvenile with whom the report is believed to have originated from, the alleged incident did not occur today as initially reported. Rather today's incident was just a sighting of a person thought to have pointed a gun several days ago, at a different location. While Fruita Police are still investigating, officers now believe the incident did not occur as reported.
- To be clear, Fruita Police believes there was never a gunman near Fruita Monument High School or Fruita 8/9 related to this incident.

- Several area agencies responded including the Fruita Police Department, Mesa County Sheriff's Office, Grand Junction Police Department, School District 51, Colorado State Patrol, Colorado Parks and Wildlife, Colorado Department of Transportation, ATF, Homeland Security, and ICE.
- We are confident there was never a gunman, never a shot fired and never an active shooter. We take this situation very seriously. We take your children's safety seriously.
- The other schools in Fruita did not go into lockdown, but did have officers there as a precaution.
- Almost all students were reunified with their parents shortly after 1:00 p.m. A handful of students whose parents could not make it at the time of reunification were kept safe at school until their parents could arrive. We know it's a long process, but we thank parents for their patience and their cooperation. Students who had to leave backpacks at school can retrieve them when school reopens in the morning.
- We'd also like to thank Victory Life Church for providing drinks, snacks and a place for parents wait for their students before the reunification process began.
- We are confident there is no evidence of a threat to students. School and activities will go on as scheduled tomorrow.

Community Center Debt Update

Deb Hinsvark with Ehlers, the City's Financial Advisor, contacted the City last week with the news that it is now possible to do an advance refunding on the City's 2009B FCC Build America Bonds if the City gives up the interest subsidy. Numbers have been run and staff is currently evaluating the potential for a 2018 advance refunding versus waiting until 2019 when the bonds can be refunded under a current refunding scenario. A quick analysis shows a 5% savings (compared to an 11% to 12% savings under scenarios we looked at last year) and that interest rates would have to go up 70 basis point (7/10th of a percentage point) between now and July of 2019 to make it more advantageous to do the advance refunding now vs the current refunding in 2019. Rates have risen about 40 basis points in the last 4 months. Will keep you posted.

The candidates' bios are on the City's website and will also be included in the next issue of the City Link. The Chamber hosted a candidate forum on March 8 at 6 pm at the Community Center that was well attended by 50-60 people and the theme of the night was very positive.

- Congrats to Todd Patton, who celebrated his 30th year anniversary with the City
- Thursday!
- Congrats to Henry Hemphill who has been promoted to Planner after an open search and hiring process.
- January City sales tax revenue was up 6% over January 2017.
- We submitted a small grant request from AGNC this week to request an additional \$9,000 for the improvements to the roundabouts.
- Cedar Way Infrastructure Project Grant application submitted this week for FMLD for additional funding necessary for full construction of the project. Anticipation of advertising the project in late summer.
- Concrete repairs at Reed Park concrete at the bathroom building has been removed and replaced this week to correct areas where doors were sticking because of heaving soils.
- Hwy 6 Sewer still working on geotechnical investigation and CDOT permitting.
- Kokopelli Trail The soil nail wall is in the process of being installed near Reed
 Wash. Contractor should be bringing in a conveyor to transport excess soil from west of Reed
 Wash to the east side which eliminates long haul routes trucking material back to the
 interchange and then around to 15 Road. Grading and soil compaction for the area between
 Reed Wash and 15 Road continues.
- The City continues to see increased residential building activity. This month we have issued 7 new residential construction planning clearances.
- Current pending development projects in the review process include: the Fruita RV Resort, Soren Subdivision, Pinewood Subdivision, and Sunset Point Subdivision.
- Staff has created a new Pre-Application form for developers to fill out prior to a development review meeting. This helps the developer get more consistent feedback from one source, rather than information from multiple parties.
- We had a great meeting and tour with two business prospects today.
- Email system was upgraded and this week was spent working through growing pains—thanks for your patience.
- We continue to work with partners planning The Trails Summit to be held in Fruita this fall.
- Staff submitted comments to the County's proposed Exempt Subdivision Text Amendment that has serious impacts to urban growth and long-term plans and agreements.
- Western Colorado Conservation Corp (youth corp), finished up their chainsaw training for their new 2018 crews at Snooks Bottom Open Space last week. They practiced their skills while removing Tamarisk and Russian Olive trees – a win-win for both WCCC and the City of Fruita.
- WCCC crews have moved out west to start constructing the single-track trail along the Kokopelli Section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail. They'll be out there for the next five weeks creating single-track goodness.
- Parks staff, with much appreciated help from Public Works staff, have been working on fixing a
 domestic water line break at Little Salt Wash Park. It's been difficult tracking down where the
 break is (ten feet in the ground).
- Tickets for the Evening of Art are still available and can be purchased at the door on Saturday night. The Gala starts at 6:30 pm at the Fruita Community Center.
- We are currently hiring for the Accountant position (reviewing applications), seasonal workers for Parks & Public Works and a Daytime Custodian for the Community Center.

- The 2017 Worker's Compensation Payroll Audit was completed and submitted this week.
