- Huge thanks to the Fruita Historic Preservation Board for their hard work in the annual Fruita History Fair Saturday! Thanks to Cavalcade for providing the great space, too.
- Planning and Engineering have submitted a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to provide an
 opportunity for interested developers to demonstrate their capability to develop a project
 located at the Lagoon property.
- Current pending development projects in the review process include: Dolan Storage Units site
 design, Wicked Wrench CUP, FHE site design, Griffin minor subdivision, Iron Wheel subdivision,
 Soren Estates final plat and Peach VRBO.
- Planning Staff Henry and Kelli spent a day with the Mesa County Building Department and participated on inspections to learn the other side of the process they work on for the City.

- We are getting interest in the RFQ for the Lagoon Redevelopment and appreciated the front page cover story by the Sentinel to highlight that request.
- Engineering has been awarded \$3,000 toward a summer intern by the American Public Works association.
- Highway 6 Interceptor Sewer is out for Bid. Bid date is June 20th. Pre-bid meeting held on the 4th of June.
- Phase II Kokopelli Trail wall construction near completion. Progress continues on preparation for concrete on east side. Piles for new bridge over Reed Wash are being scheduled.
- Rimrock Trail repair project is scheduled to go out to advertisement for bid within the next 2 weeks.
- Cedar Way Infrastructure Improvement project is scheduled for a mid-August bid date.
- Pinewood Estates is under construction.
- Adobe Falls preconstruction meeting occurred this week.
- Construction at FHE expansion to start next week.
- Imondi Wakezone received a partial zoning final from the City for a soft opening pending Mesa County Building Departments inspections. There are some other items to be completed early next week prior to the official opening.
- The outdoor pool opens for the season this Saturday YEA and staff is preparing for the busiest months of the year at the FCC.
- We had another large irrigation line break at Little Salt Wash Park. Parks staff worked diligently
 to fix it this past week as we could not go without water at the park. LSWP will be hosting the
 FMHS baseball skills camp next week and a Triple Crown baseball tournament the weekend of
 Mike the Headless Chicken Festival.
- Speaking of Mike the Headless Chicken, the annual Festival is a week away. Entertainment headline on Friday evening is Son Volt and on Saturday evening Reckless Kelly will be on stage. Should be another fun and great Mike Festival. See the full schedule & poster below.
- Work has begun on the request for proposals for the north Fruita Desert Master Plan to go out soon.
- Looks like the recent trails fundraising is paying off well with some more to raise but on track for the rest of the planned trails at Kokopelli Trailhead to be constructed this fall.
- The Mayor and I met with the organizer of the Kokopelli 140 this week to assist in his video shot for a commercial—still proud of the Mayor who is riding the full 140. We are putting together a City of Fruita team to ride the relay.
- We have sent out invoices of the partner agencies and working on setting up the project for replacing the information panels at the Welcome Center.
- Celebrating our amazing Public Works and Parks crews during National Public Works Week, they
 enjoyed quite the brat and burger luncheon Thursday—We're lucky to have such hard working,
 dedicated coworkers.



- Public Works Wastewater Collections Division filmed the inside of 13,016 feet of sewer lines in April.
- The Traffic Safety Division has been busy painting public parking stalls.
- Colorado Mesa University came and picked up all stored biosolids in stock from the WWRF (don't worry, we'll make more). This is the second season that CMU has used it and they have had good results.
- Congrats to Jason Martinez who passed his Class A wastewater license test!!
- The request for proposals for a Sewer Rate Study is out to advertisement with proposals due June 6th.
