### Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Jennifer Stoll, Greater Grand Junction Sports Commission will present to City Council. Ryan Burke with Slate Communications, the City's tourism marketing firm, will present to Council a summary of the 2018 campaign and the efforts planned for 2019. A few items regarding Family Health West are also on the agenda. Two letters of support to acquire scholarships for their Emergency Department physicians to attend a conference are on the Consent Agenda.

Our relay team had a "fun" time as well and Family Health West had a 100-mile relay team that did great! #### TID BITS:

- While Mayor Kincaid was riding just few miles on his mountain bike (☺ 140+) and after I slept 2 hours after riding in the night, Mayor Pro Tem Buck and I attended a meeting with Senator Gardner and other partners in the Grand Valley Saturday strategizing how to attract BLM headquarters to the Grand Valley.
- Please see the Museum of Western Colorado and GJ Chamber requests for applications to recognize companies, businesses, shops, factories, services, civic groups, farms and ranches that have served the Grand Valley for at least a century with induction into the 100+ Society below.
- I am beginning to review applications of qualified master students in the DOLA Best & Brightest program and will be interviewing them Oct. 4. The program begins in January.
- We met with Imondi Wake Zone about their first season (which continues into Nov) which they feel is going successfully and they will be hosting a large wake board competition at 10 am Saturday, Sept. 29 and now partner with Fruita Monument High School's new 40-member Wake Board Club.

- Met with the Fruita Chamber Government Affairs Committee this week and shared some of the recent legislative information we have received from CML.
- We met with Conservation Colorado this week about assistance in seeking partnerships for the mountain properties to maintain rights and public use.
- We met with a representative from the US Census Bureau this week about their 2019 education efforts for the 2020 Census count. This will incorporate establishing a group of local residents to serve as advisors to the Census workers—this is called a Complete Count Committee and Council will need to discuss in the near future.
- Since the last City Council workshop on a few code updates, we have conducted a workshop with Planning Commission, the Downtown Advisory Board Committee and the Chamber. We plan to begin rolling these changes through the process, as directed by Council, beginning with the Planning Commission meeting in October.

### **Engineering**

- Highway 6 Sewer Extension Project is waiting on manholes to start the pipe installation. All the manhole piles were driven last week for the manholes in the River Road right of way alignment.
- Fruita RV Resort has been approved for construction.
- Rim Rock Trail pouring concrete on west end and finishing up the landscape rock between Arches Drive and Aspen Village Subdivision.
- Cedar Way Infrastructure Improvements will start soon. This will affect Pine Street for the storm drain connection at McCune and Aspen Avenue at Cedar Way for the sewer and storm drain installation.
- The 2018 Sidewalk Trip Hazard Mitigation Project will repair offset sidewalk joints by grinding and will start soon in various areas of the city. This project was awarded to Precision Concrete Cutting.
- The 2018 Concrete Placement Project will also start soon. This year's budget will be spent on replacing several curb ramps that don't meet current ADA standards.

- Fruita Collar Club Conditional Use Permit- dog boarding/daycare facility located at 110 E. McCune Ave.
- Family Health West has received a planning clearance to begin construction on an additional parking lot shared by the City and Colorado Canyons Hospital adding 31 parking spaces. They begin construction next week.

### **Municipal Court**

- The Court has revised its procedures to comply with legislation that took effect this summer.
- The Court is now required to appoint counsel for a defendant who is making a first appearance, while in custody, on a charge with a possible jail sentence. It is extremely rare in Fruita Municipal Court that a defendant would be in custody when making a first appearance. The Court IS prepared, however, to appoint counsel in such situations, when there is a charge with a possible jail sentence.
- The Court now advises each defendant that if he or she is a veteran or active duty member of the military, he or she may be entitled to receive mental health treatment, substance use treatment, or other veteran services. The Court now also considers favorably the completion of a veteran treatment program when determining whether to seal a criminal record.
