This Wednesday, the Parks and Recreation Department was awarded a \$75,000 grant from GOCO to update the Fruita POST Plan. This money will be used to add two new components to the POST Plan, and those are Health and Recreation. The new plan will also update existing components and evaluating priority projects relating to existing and new parks, trails, open space, and expansion to the Community Center.


