#### CDOT Maintenance on Aspen Avenue and Highway 340 This Week

On Sunday May 12th, CDOT will be out in Fruita for restriping the Highway 340 roundabouts and other highway areas. They will also be reconfiguring the striping on Aspen Avenue along the frontage of City Market (Highway 340 to Plum St.) There will no longer be a free right off Highway 340. Northbound traffic turning right onto Aspen will be required to yield to eastbound traffic into a single lane. The work will be performed at night as to not disrupt daytime traffic.

We rode from Civic Center Park to Loma via the Kokopelli Section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail, then rode to Heritage Park, and then ended our ride back at Civic Center. - I had a great time working with Dominic and Josh in the Parks Crew Monday from 6-12 learning about the hard work they put into keeping Little Salt Wash Park maintained. I was able to drag all four baseball fields and chalk some lines (so that is why they were a little crooked ①). We have awesome, hardworking staff. It was impressive to see how much pride and passion Dominic has for the park, participants and community and the details he manages to keep the operation extremely efficient!
- On Monday, I also attended the Mesa County Trails Advisory Committee to focus on the job description and hiring process for the Trails Coordinator to see the Grand Valley Trails Plan implemented.
- We are working out the details for the upcoming Open House and Community Character Workshop for Fruita in Motion with our consultants this week.
- Shannon Vassen and I attended the CML spring outreach and new Director Kevin Bommer Listening Tour.

 Councilman Karisny, Odette and I attended the unveiling of the new Colorado Welcome sign at the Fruita state welcome center presented by Colorado Tourism Office Executive Director Cathy Ritter.

 Mayor Kincaid and I represented the City on the panel of valleyside governments at the second annual State of the Valley Luncheon hosted by the Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce.

 The City Manager Engagement series had a hike scheduled for Opal Hill meeting at Snooks Bottom Thursday, but we didn't have anyone show for this one except staff and Councilman Karisny—so we called it early due to rain and work to be done.

- I had the opportunity for the fourth year in a row to speak to the Grand Valley Leadership class today—we have three employees graduating from this class, Chris Dehmel, Kelli McLean, and Billie Nix.
- We had the opportunity to meet with and share a bit about the community with Patagonia and some of their dealers in town for a dealer tour and at the Life of Pie event at Hot Tomato this week.
- We are meeting with and touring Nathan Fey, director of Colorado's Office of Outdoor Recreation Industry Nathan Fey. Nathan was the previous Deputy Director and Acting Director. - We have been interviewing this week to hire an intern for the summer. This will be the 3<sup>rd</sup> year Engineering has had a summer intern. The program has been a great success.
- Maple Street Sewer project will begin construction on June 3rd. Expect a road closure between Ottley Ave. and Pabor Ave.

 Re-configuration of the striping on Aspen Avenue in the block in front of City Market is still on track to occur late Sunday night. The southbound free-right turn will be eliminated. The future configuration will require a yield to eastbound traffic. Colorado Department of Transportation is performing the work.

#### Parks & Recreation

- NFD Trails Master Plan was supported by City Council on Tuesday evening. With the help and support of our partners, (BLM, COPMOBA, CPW, Hot Tomato, Over the Edge and Colorado Backcountry Bikers) we believe we put together a good plan for future development and maintenance of trails in the North Fruita Desert.
- Unfortunately, the I-70 underpasses at Reed Wash and along the Kokopelli Section of the CRT were tagged with graffiti this week. Parks staff is working to cover and clean up the graffiti. It is disappointing that this occurred on a newly constructed stretch of trail.
- Fruita Fat Tire Festival overall was a success. We are working to schedule a wrap-up meeting with the event organizers to review the festival.
- Staff is working with COPMOBA and Western Colorado Conservation Corp to schedule a 3-person Trails crew to perform maintenance at the North Fruita Desert (18 Road), Kokopelli Trail System and the trails in the Front Country (Devil's Canyon, Fruita Paleo, etc.)
- Western Colorado Conservation Corp did some great work this week clearing tamarisk, russian olive, dead plant debris along the Little Salt Wash at two locations: east of Dan Williams Park and at Village of Country Creek. We'd like to thank the Lower Valley Fire Department for their support in clearing up the wash corridors as they have been actively seeking grant funding for this purpose.


