General Updates

- The Pabor Day Festival is tomorrow with fun events happening all day thanks to the Fruita Historic Preservation Commission and the Downtown Advisory Board. See poster and activities below.
- The Fruita Fat Tire Festival and 18 Hours of Fruita were a great success this year. There was a 5% increase in pass sales from last year and 18 Hours of Fruita sold out in November. Local businesses reported great sales for the weekend and restaurants generated more business than previous years. There were participants from 21 states and Canada for the Fat Tire Festival, and 12 states and Canada for 18 Hours of Fruita. We are already looking forward to next which will be the 25th anniversary of the festival.
- Following a week with Patagonia hosting a dealer camp in Fruita, we welcomed Pivot Cycles to Fruita this week who will be here for a week hosting racers, editors and dealers with the launch of a new bike something we have coordinated with them since Interbike last year. Mayor Kincaid, Mayor Pro Tem Buck, Steve J. with GJEP, Shannon and I had dinner with them when they arrived this week.
- The Life of Pie event last Saturday night was attended by 400-500 people and a great celebration of a local business and the Fruita community.
- We hosted AARP State Director Bob Murphy for a meeting with staff and Lori Buck, as well as at the Livability Commission meeting. The Livability Commission will be assisting in getting the word out to the community during the Fruita in Motion process, studying livability successes in other communities and assisting with the 2020 Census count.
- Regarding Fruita in Motion, there was an unforeseen emergency that came up with







our consultant team and they were not able to make it for this week's scheduled Steering Committee meeting. Due t the nature of the meeting it was necessary to cancel, and it will be rescheduled. For now, we focus on the Community Open House (highlighted above) for Thursday, May 23rd at 5:30 pm at the Community Center.

- We wrapped up the Chamber Government Affairs meeting season now that the legislative session is over and appreciate that committee's efforts this session.
- Congrats to Rim Rock Adventures who are into their 30th season in Fruita!
- We had a great time touring Nathan Fey, Colorado's Executive Director of the Outdoor Recreation Industry Office around Fruita to see development opportunities, learn about the community and to meet some local business owners from Rim Rock Adventures, Imondi Wakezone and Hot Tomato.



Administration/Finance

- Margaret and I presented to Standard & Poor's regarding the City operations and financial status in relation to the refunding the FCC bonds seeking a higher financial rating. We should know the results in early June.
- City sales tax revenue is up 13.56% over 2018 for the first three months.
- The auditors have wrapped up their review of the 2018 Financial Statements and are scheduled to make a presentation at the June 4, 2019 Council meeting.
- Staff is working on the Property/Casualty insurance renewal application with CIRSA

Engineering

• CDOT continues to work on restriping Aspen Avenue and will be installing turn arrow stencils this week. CDOT will not be doing any restriping or grinding on Aspen for about two weeks.

Work on the Maple Street Sewer Project will begin on Monday, June 3, 2019. United Companies
will be milling out the asphalt in Maple Street for the limits of the sewer trench in preparations
for the pipe installation.

• The April Fruita Digital marketing Analytics Report is provided below. In April, our tourism total reach increased by 164% on Facebook and 130% on Instagram. Also, we have more followers on both platforms, and saw an increase in engagements from last month on Instagram.

Fruita named a Bronze-Level Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists

Fruita, Colorado --- Today, the League of American Bicyclists recognized Fruita, Colorado with a Bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community (BFC) award, joining 476 communities across the country in building better places for people to bike. With today's announcement of ten new and renewing BFCs, Fruita joins group of communities that are transforming the American landscape and leading on livability measurements important to community members.

"We applaud communities like Fruita for making bicycling a safe, comfortable, and convenient option for transportation and recreation," said Bill Nesper, Executive Director of the League of American Bicyclists. "We are inspired by leaders who see bicycling as a way to build more vibrant, healthy, sustainable and connected communities and be a part of the solution to many complex public health and safety challenges faced at both the community and national levels."

The League of American Bicyclists' Bicycle Friendly America program sets the standard for how communities evaluate their quality of life, sustainability, and accessibility, while allowing them to benchmark progress toward making biking better. With this latest round of new and renewing awardees, there are currently 476 Bicycle Friendly Communities in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. The Bronze-level BFC award recognizes Fruita's commitment to improving conditions for bicycling through investments in bike infrastructure, education programs, and promoting and encouraging bicycling through events and pro-bicycling policies.

The City of Fruita also just completed the 4.5-mile Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail. This portion of the trail was completed with single-track sidewalk off shoots and connects the whole community to public lands, specifically, the Kokopelli Trail System. Cyclists can now ride all the way from Palisade to Moab via the Riverfront Trail and the Kokopelli Trail.

More than 800 communities have applied for recognition by the Bicycle Friendly Community program, which provides a roadmap to making biking better for communities of all shapes and sizes. The rigorous application process is an educational tool in itself, and includes an opportunity for local bicyclists to provide input on their experiences and perceptions of bicycling in their community.

The five levels of the BFC award – diamond, platinum, gold, silver and bronze, plus an honorable mention category and a no designation level – provide a clear incentive for communities to continuously improve. Awarded communities must renew their status every four years to ensure that they not only maintain existing efforts, but also keep up with changing technology, national safety standards, and community-driven best practices.
