Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting on Tuesday will begin with recognizing the Fruita Monument High School Teacher and Student of the month for September. After that, there are two proclamations for Family Health West Day and Hunger Awareness Month. There will then be two presentations, one on the City of Fruita's Community Profile in the Comprehensive Plan Update, and a presentation on the Fruita Branch of the Mesa County Libraries by new Director Michelle Boisvenue. There are four items on the consent agenda, and our meeting will conclude with three quasi-judicial hearings on planning and development items.

Fruita in Motion Update – Community Character Workshop

Last Thursday, the planning team held a design workshop with the steering committee, members of the City Council, and the Downtown Advisory Board. The team presented an audit of existing design standards and downtown character. The group then discussed the future of Downtown Fruita, the Highway 6&50 corridor, and potential areas of transition in Fruita. - City sales tax continues to trend up year to date. June's sales tax revenues were up 13.16% from the previous year. Lodging tax is also up 25.67% in June of 2019 when compared to June 2018. We are still trending behind 2018 for lodging tax revenues, but after June, the gap is now only 2.26%.

We are excited that she will bring new ideas and classes to the FCC in the future.
- Recreation Staff will be interviewing three candidates for the Youth Activities Coordinator position on Wednesday, September 3rd. We hope to have that position filled soon afterwards.

• Chief Krouse and I attended the Grand Junction Regional Communications Center Board meeting and received a presentation regarding the 2020 proposed budget. The budget as proposed included an approximate 12% increase for the City of Fruita. The budget will be further discussed and voted upon at another meeting later in September.

Public Works

- Crews were busy with asphalt patching this week throughout the City.
- Erosion of some drainage and irrigation facilities developed this week on the property owned by the City of Fruita near 16 Road and L Road. The City worked with Grand Valley Drainage District, Mesa County, and the property lessee to develop a plan to protect 16 Road, which will include temporarily rerouting the flows away from the road and extending the public drainage facilities such that the private irrigation ditch can dry out and be piped later this year.
- This week, the Public Crews painted a portion of the Colorado Riverfront Trail at the Little Salt Wash to help with visibility and keep bicycle and pedestrian traffic safe when there is low light. Thank you to Fruita Velo for the picture.
