Tourism and Special Event Funding Application Now Available

Each year, the Fruita Tourism and Advisory Board accepts applications for Tourism and Special Events funding. The deadline to apply for tourism or special event funding for next year, fiscal year 2020, will be on Friday, September 20, 2019 at 5:00 p.m. MST. Final decisions on funding requests will be made no later than December 13, 2019, and applicants will be notified of the decision on their funding request. In the past, this money has helped fund events such as the Fruita Fall Festival, the Fat Tire Festival, Deserts Rats Triathlon, and many more events. General Updates

- The Fall City Link is now available and should be arriving at homes and businesses this weekend or early next week. If you want to view it online, you can here.
- In August, residents recycled 44 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. The full report is provided below.
- The August Planning and Development Report and the Breakdown of New Code Enforcement Issues is now available and can be viewed at this link.
- We had a good turnout for the Coffee with the City Manager at Starbucks on Thursday. We discussed the community plan update, the Fruita Rec Center, and other issues that were on the resident's minds. Our next event will be a hike up Dino Hill on September 24, 2019 at 4:00 p.m.
- Thursday morning, Mayor Pro Tem Buck, Councilor Karisny, staff and I interviewed three candidates for the role of Municipal Prosecutor. We should be bringing a contract to the City Council at the September 17, 2019 meeting to fill this position.
- If you're heading out to Highline Lake this weekend, don't forget that the Desert's Edge Triathlon Festival is happening on Saturday and Sunday. The City of Fruita is a sponsor of this event, and it is two days of racing and camping.
- The Draft Plan Party for the Community Plan Update will be on October 3, 2019 from 4:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Civic Center Park. This is an opportunity for the community to learn about the plan in a fun and interactive environment. The main ideas will be presented, and there will be food and drinks provided as well. Hope that everyone can make it! The full flyer is below.
- The Survey for the name of the new Fruita Elementary School has closed and will be revealed at the upcoming groundbreaking. If you are interested in attending the groundbreaking, it is on September 17th at 4:30 p.m. at the new school site.
- The last Food Truck Friday of the year is tonight! Head downtown for a variety of food, live local music, and family fun.

• Had a great conversation with Superintendent Diana Sirko related to the new school project and K.4 Rd project. Next week they will determine if these items will be placed on their Board agenda on the 17th. If so, we will send a representative to discuss. We were also able to tour one bboard member to the sites Thursday.

Administration/Finance

- The online payment system has been in place for one month. The City had 139 online payment transactions for the month. We have seen a significant increase in customers signing up for ACH payments (automatic monthly debits from their account) over the last month and approximately 20% of our customers on ACH. This is the most efficient method of payment for our staff.
- Work continues on the budget and the draft 2020 Budget is scheduled to be presented to the Council at the September 24th workshop.

Engineering

- The Encanto Irrigation Line will be out of service next week Monday and Tuesday for relocation and connections related to the new elementary school. Notice to affected neighborhoods has been made.
- Kokopelli Trail Extension at 16 Road notice of award sent to MA Concrete Construction, Inc.
- The crosswalk at Sycamore St. & Ottley Avenue is complete. It should provide a safer crossing of Ottley. The refuge island reduces the crossing distance while meeting the requirements of ADA. The crossing was placed west of the street alignment to allow northbound left turns onto Ottley room to negotiate the turn as well as would not provide a conflict for any westbound left turns onto Sycamore St. to conflict with the island.

Parks and Recreation

- Another reminder, the Fruita Recreation Center (FCC) will be closed from September 15, 2019 to September 22, 2019 for our annual maintenance week.
- Staff continues to make progress on filling the Youth Activities Coordinator position at the FCC. For the first time, the Fruita Youth Action Council participated in the interviews and completed a team building exercise with the applicants. Nine members of the Council participated, and it was great to have their input on the applicants.
- The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board meeting has been rescheduled to this upcoming Monday, September 9, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. at the City Shops.



Avoided 123 Metric Tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions


