Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- COVID-19 2.0 Dial in Effect Tomorrow. Late this afternoon, state officials announced that Colorado's COVID-19 2.0 dial will go into effect tomorrow, Saturday February 6,2021. The new dial includes new metrics and will consider numbers from a 7-day period, as opposed to a 14-day period. A FAQ on the new dial is available here. Looking at these metrics, staff does not anticipate that Mesa County will change levels yet (unless there is some sort of broad executive decision, similar to when we moved up to orange), as the 7-day case count is greater than 300 (the new allowable amount for Level Yellow). There are also no anticipated changes to the Variance Protection Program, but we will continue to provide information as it becomes available. Here are a few of the highlights:
- Counties in Level Green must now have no more than 15 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people in one week OR a comparable number cases in counties with under 20,000 people.
- Counties in Level Blue must now have between 15 and 100 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people in one week.
- Counties in Level Yellow must now have between 100 and 300 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people in one week. The rate of positive tests must be no more than 7.5%.
- Counties in Level Orange (where Mesa County and Fruita is now) must now have between 300 and 500 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people in one week. The rate of positive tests must be no more than 10%.
- Counties in Level Red will now have more than 501 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people in one week. At this level, hospital system capacity is constrained, and state assistance is requested for patient transport or staff augmentation.
- In counties at Level Purple, statewide hospital capacity risks being breached, and crisis standards of care are approaching.
- Grant for Food Bank of the Rockies. This week, we awarded Food Bank of the Rockies a \$10,000 grant to help offset the costs of food for Fruita Food Banks during 2020. Food banks in the area saw an increase in use for most of last year. There are four branches of food banks in Fruita that this funding will help, including Agape

Food Bank, Canyon West Worship Center Food Bank, Hope of the Grand Valley, and the food bank at Victory Life Church. We are thankful for this partnership with Food Bank of the Rockies and appreciate their efforts throughout the pandemic. Thank you! This grant was funded through Coronavirus Relief funds.

- **COVID-19 Vaccine Update from MCPH.** After the changes to the vaccine distribution prioritization last week, Mesa County Public Health released a newsletter highlighting the changes and how to get vaccinated. The full newsletter can be found here, and here are a few of the highlights:
 - Vaccine Distribution Update Last week, Governor Polis announced an update to the COVID-19 vaccine prioritization list, in anticipation of receiving an increased supply of doses in Colorado. MCPH will provide an interest form with the new phases before February 8.
 - Phase 1B will now be known as Phase 1B.1, which is where we are right now. This phase includes Coloradans 70 and older, as well as moderate risk health care workers and first responders. individuals 70 and older will continue to be the highest priority for MCPH until more vaccine is received in Mesa County.
 - Phase 1B.2 includes Coloradans aged 65-69, as well as PreK-12 educators and childcare workers in licensed programs. They will become eligible for vaccination on February 8.
 - Phase 1B.3 includes frontline essential workers and Coloradans ages 16-64 with two or more high-risk conditions. They will be eligible to be vaccinated in early March.
 - O How to Get Vaccinated There are a number of ways for individuals to receive the vaccine when it becomes available, based on their distribution priority group. Right now, during phase 1B.1, most health care workers and first responders who are eligible will have the option to sign up for a vaccine through their employer. Individuals who are eligible because they are age 70 or older have a few options for receiving the vaccine, such as:
 - Fill out the vaccine interest form on the MCPH website here. MCPH will contact you when vaccine is available and provide a link to make an appointment.
 - Check with your health care provider. Both the VA Western Colorado and SCL Health, the parent company of St. Mary's Medical Center, are contacting priority group patients who receive care at one of their facilities.
- Vaccine Clinic at FHW. If you noticed the Fruita Community Center and Family Health West (FHW) more busy than usual today, the hospital hosted a vaccine clinic. FHW estimated that 800 people age 70 years or older were able to get a vaccine at the clinic. The participants were on the vaccine distribution from MCPH, and all had appointments to get the shot. Thank you, Family Health West, for the great work!


Housing Needs Survey

The City of Grand Junction, the Grand Junction Economic Partnership, and their partners throughout the Grand Valley, have launched a housing needs survey. The goal of the survey is to understand the decisions people make when choosing where to live and work. This survey will also help the partners accommodate the types of housing residents want and need. Answers to the survey will inform

General Updates

- **New Residential Units.** The City permitted 83 new residential units in 2020, up from 62 in 2019. The full report is below.
- Commissions Approve Spotted Lanternfly Petition. This week, the Mesa County Commissioners
 unanimously approved the Upper Grand Valley Pest Control District Advisory Committee's
 (UGVPCD) petition to add the Spotted Lanternfly to the list of regulated species to be controlled
 within the District and to put this question on the ballot. The UGVPCD currently has 12
 regulated insect species and six regulated weed species. For more information, you can visit

- White Iced Virtual Celebration. If you are interested in attending, the District #51 Foundation White Iced Celebration will be held virtually tomorrow night. Full details at this link.
- Loader Trainer. On Monday, I joined the Public Works Department for training on the new Cat 930 M Loader that was approved in this year's budget. The loader replaces the backhoe that the department was using and will be used to for a variety of purposes, such as installing the concrete drain inlet box (weights around 6,000 lbs.) on E. Aspen Avenue, for loading salt and chat into the dump trucks for snow removal, to maintain the pond properties, and to move concrete manholes and other heavy objects, and much more, including emergency uses. While I am a bit disappointed that I did not get to drive the loader (or maybe relieved), I was excited to join Public Works for the training!



Engineering

- The Maple St. Improvements Project Phase 2 bid opening was held on Friday with the apparent low bidder being Sorter Construction with a bid amount of \$415,965.
- The Ash Street Sewer Project pre-construction meeting is scheduled for this coming Monday. Sorter Construction will also be constructing this project.

Parks and Recreation

- The Fruita Community Center (FCC) turned ten on Monday, February 1st! To mark the occasion, free cake and rally towels were given away to FCC visitors. Memories and a Top 10 List of Things to Love About the FCC were shared on social media here. We want to thank everyone who has used the FCC over the past 10 years for fitness, for fun, to learn something new, to celebrate a special moment thank you for sharing those moments of your life with us! We look forward to the future and making more memories with our community.
- The newest edition of the Fruita Parks and Recreation bimonthly newsletter can be found here:
 <u>Register Now for the 2021 Sweetheart Run</u>. This edition includes information on the 10 Year
 Anniversary of the FCC, new fitness classes and programs that are available (including the
 Sweetheart Run this month), upcoming Senior hikes, and more!
- While the Fruita Community Center saw an increase in usage in January, it remains at about 44% of normal visitation (compared to '19/'20 visitations). In January we had just over 8,000 visits to the FCC which is up from 5,700 visits in December 2020 but still down by over 10,000 visits compared to January 2020. Overall, in 2020, the FCC had 82,001 visits which is down by over 100,000 visits from 2019. Anecdotally, we have seen an increase in pass registrations, and we have been hitting capacity in the pool during the weekends so we hope to see even more visitation in the coming months. - The FCC is offering a new senior pass called RenewActive. Many Silver and Fit pass holders have transitioned to a new insurance carrier and RenewActive is the counterpart to Silver and Fit. The Silver Sneakers program is still available. If you have any questions about any of these senior pass options at the FCC, please contact the Front Desk at 970-858-0360. Public Works

- Crews are scheduled to begin work on the I-70 Billboard improvements on February 15, 2021, and it is expected that the work will take around two weeks to complete. The work will improve the system to hold the wrapping in place, improve lighting, and will also include electrical upgrades. The billboard is currently leased to Family Health West, and these improvements were budgeted for in the Marketing and Promotion budget this year.
- Due to an increase in grease collections lately, Wastewater staff is preparing a grease education letter for restaurants. Crews have hauled 2,000 gallons of grease form the I-70 lift station to the Wastewater Reclamation Facility. Staff continues to encourage businesses and residents to dispose of grease properly and to never dispose of grease down a drain.
- Tentatively, crews are planning to burn piles at the lagoons property early next week. We have received a burn permit from Mesa County and will check air quality conditions before burning.
 A public works employee will be at the fire at all times while burning and Lower Valley Fire Department will also be aware of the burning.




