Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday night will be held virtually and in-person at the Fruita Civic Center. We will begin our meeting with one proclamation, proclaiming next week as "National Public Works Week" in the City of Fruita. Following that, the Council will consider seven items on the consent agenda, and there are two public hearings items (one on a budget amendment and the other on a special event liquor permit). On the administrative agenda, the Council will be updated on Capital Projects and the Municipal Court. The meeting will conclude with two executive sessions. Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- **CDC Announcement.** The Center for Disease Control announced Thursday fully vaccinated people can resume activities without wearing a mask or physically distancing, except where required by federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial laws, rules, and regulations, including local business and workplace guidance. - Vaccine Update from MCPH. Each week, Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) releases an update on COVID-19 vaccinations. This week's full report can be found at this <u>link</u>, and here are a few of the highlights from the update:
- o On May 10, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) authorized the Pfizer vaccine for emergency use in children ages 12-15.
- The CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) needs to recommend use before Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) can offer appointments to this age group.
- The ACIP is meeting Wednesday, May 12, to make a recommendation on the vaccine's use for this group.

Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

- If recommended, individuals aged 12-15 will be able to sign up for a vaccine on the MCPH website as early as Thursday, May 13, with appointments as soon as Saturday, May 15.
- The Community Vaccination Site (CVS) at the Grand Junction Convention Center will relocate to the MCPH building (510 29 1/2 Rd) on May 19. If you are getting your first Moderna or Pfizer vaccine dose this week, your second dose will be administered at MCPH.
- MCPH is working to make getting a COVID-19 vaccine as convenient as possible and offers evening and weekend appointments.
- COVID-19 Hospitalizations. In addition to the vaccine update, MCPH also released an update today on hospitalizations that can be viewed here: COVID-19 Hospitalizations Contributing to Health Care System Overload. Here are a few updates from the release, you can view the link for more.
 - MCPH continues to respond to an elevated number of COVID-19 cases and is seeing increased community transmission with variant strains.
 - The number of patients hospitalized with COVID-19 has nearly doubled in recent weeks.
 On May 13, hospitals reported 8 COVID-19 patients in ICU, and 25 total confirmed hospitalizations.
 - MCPH asks residents for their continued support and to consider aiding the community efforts to end the pandemic. The most effective ways to prevent the spread of any COVID-19 virus are to stay home when you are not feeling well, wash hands often, and get a COVID-19 vaccine.
- **ARPA Guidance.** On Monday, the United States Department of Treasury released the interim guidance on funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The City of Fruita is slated to receive \$2.89 million from the federal legislation. Similar to Coronavirus Relief Funds process, staff and I will continue to learn more about the program and determine what programs and expenses may be eligible for the funding. We will continue to keep the Council updated on potential uses of the funding.

General Updates

- Financial Reports. City sales tax continues to be strong in Fruita. In the month of March, revenues were up 13% from the previous year, and are up 13% year to date. Use tax on motor vehicles (up 30% in March), City lodging tax (up 134% from March 2020), and county sales tax (up 42%) were also up from the previous year. Use tax on building materials was down 21% in March but is still up 14% year to date from last year. More information can be found in the Council packet this week at this link.
- Coffee with the City Manager and Dr. Korrey Klein Next Week. Next Thursday morning, I will be hosting a Coffee with the City Manager at Bestslope Coffee 8:00 a.m. and will be joined by Dr. Korrey Klein. Dr. Klein is the CEO and President of Family Health West, and these events are an opportunity to hear from residents, have an open conversation, and answer questions. I look forward to the discussions!
- **State of the Valley Luncheon.** On May 19, 2021, the Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce will be hosting the State of the Valley Luncheon. The luncheon will take place at

- Colorado Mesa University at 12:00 p.m. Mayor Kincaid and I will be speaking at the luncheon, along with elected officials and staff from the Town of Palisade, Mesa County, and City of Grand Junction. If you are interested in attending, you can register here.
- **Community Survey Closing.** Tomorrow is the last day for residents to fill out the Community Survey! If you haven't already, please visit the link found on the survey to provide your feedback and recommendations on City services for the next several years. We are still on track to have the survey results presented at the first Council Meeting in June.
- Grant Applications. This week, staff and I submitted two grant applications the first for the
 Resiliency Recovery Roadmap program through the Department of Local Affairs for the Mesa
 County Emergency First Responders; and the second for improvements to S. Mesa Street for
 the CDOT Revitalizing Main Street program. With all of the funding opportunities currently
 available, staff is in the process of working on other grant applications and we will keep you
 updated on those and the outcome of these two grants.
- Mesa County Commissioners Town Hall. Following up from a previous update, we will be
 hosting a Town Hall for the Mesa County Commissioners on August 24, 2021, at the Fruita Civic
 Center. This meeting will occur in place of our regular workshop meeting for August.
- Waste Management Report. In April 2021, Fruita residents recycled 54 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full April 2021 report can be found below.
- State of the City Video. This morning, Mayor Kincaid and I wrapped up filming for the first Fruita State of the City Video. We are excited to share this video with the public and celebrate some of the City's accomplishments from the previous year. We anticipate that the video will be completed in the next several weeks. Thank you to all our partners that participated in the video!



• **Iowa State Volunteers.** On Tuesday, staff and I delivered lunch to over 30 students from Iowa State University. This group of volunteers uses their spring break to travel from city to city participating in clean-up activities. The students were helping with cleaning at the North Fruita Desert campgrounds and were traveling to Moab later in the day. Thank you to the Iowa State students for volunteering their time to help clean up our public lands!



Administration

• **Utility Billing Update.** Beginning this week, utility billing staff began charging late payments on past due bills. The moratorium on late fees has been lifted at the state level. If you have any questions or would like to speak to someone from utility billing, you can call our main line at9 70-858-3663.

- **2021 Street Overlays.** Bids were opened on Friday with 3 responses and the apparent low bidder, United Companies, with a bid amount of \$239,681.50
- **Engineering Intern.** Christian Torchia will begin work with the Engineering Department beginning May 25, 2021. The internship will last for 12 weeks.
- *Maple St. Sewer.* Aspen Avenue sewer work began this week with pavement milling operations. Aspen Avenue will remain closed to through traffic during construction.
- 18½ Road Culvert at Little Salt Wash. Wingwalls are near complete. Paving of 18½ Road was scheduled for Friday.

• *Thursday Night Concert Series.* The Thursday Night Concert Series is returning this year and will be held on Thursdays from June 10, 2021 to August 12, 2021. The concerts will start at 7:30

- p.m., and will continue to take place at the Fruita Civic Center Park. The full line up can be found in the flyer below, and we are excited to be able to bring these concerts back to the community.
- Parks and Recreation Newsletter. - Maintenance Issues. Staff has been working a few irrigation and water line breaks. The irrigation line in front of the Cavalcade was broken from a tree root. It has been repairs and concrete will be going back in next week. FCC staff is still hunting down a pool line break in the outdoor pool but hope to have the located soon and repair as soon as possible. This may impact opening the outdoor pool but we are not sure of timing as of yet.


