Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday night will begin with proclaiming August 21, 2021, as "Ellen Roberts Day" in the City of Fruita, as Ellen will be celebrating her 100th Birthday. There are several items on the consent agenda. After considering those items, there are three quasi-judicial hearings scheduled on Planning and Development items. For the City Manager's report, in addition to regular updates, I will share a brief update on the H2S project at the Wastewater Treatment Plant in this year's budget. Coronavirus Update

• Weekly COVID-19 Update from MCPH. Here are a few updates from Mesa County Public Health's weekly update on COVID-19 in Mesa County. The full report can be found at this link.

COVID-19 Case Trends

- Community transmission remains high, with a decline in average daily cases.
- Four weeks ago, the average daily case count was 33, in the most recent week, the average daily case count is 21.

o Delta Variant Spread

- There are 1,002 cases of Delta variant in Mesa County.
- The rate of new Delta variant cases has remained relatively steady in recent weeks but has plummeted since our peak in early July.
- Available vaccines reduce severe illness, including hospitalization and death, associated with all COVID-19 strains, including emerging variants.

Vaccine and Testing Efforts

- Getting a COVID-19 vaccine is quick and easy, plan for about 30 minutes.
- The Community Vaccination Site, located at 510 29 ½ Road, accepts walk-ins for COVID-19 vaccine.

Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

- Hours of operation are Wednesday through Friday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- All three vaccine types are available, residents are able to choose which vaccine they would like.
- Testing is free.
- The Mesa County community COVID-19 testing site offers the Cue test, a highly accurate, rapid COVID-19 test. Results are available in about 20 minutes.

I-70 Update from CDOT

On Thursday, CDOT and the Governor's office announced that I-70 in Glenwood Canyon will reopen tomorrow following weeks of clean-up. Although it could change, CDOT believes that one lane in each direction will be able to safely open tomorrow. CDOT stated that motorists should plan for slower speeds through canyon for the foreseeable future and the speed limit will be reduced. CDOT crews will continue to monitor for inclement weather may close the highway again if conditions are deemed unsafe. Here is a photo from the CDOT update from this afternoon.



Boards and Commissions Vacancies (Continued)

General Updates

- Financial Reports. June 2021 tax revenues are available in this week's Council packet here, and it was another great month. City sales tax revenues were up 23% in June when compared to 2020 and are up 20% overall year to date. Use taxes on motor vehicles (up 2% in June, 23% YTD), building materials (up 93% in June, 16% YTD) and County sales taxes (up 20% in June, 25% YTD) were also up. The lodging tax also continues to be very strong when compared to 2020 and was up 172% in June.
- Roundabouts Update and Ribbon Cutting. On August 27, 2021, at 5:00 p.m., the Fruita Arts and Culture Board will be hosting a ribbon cutting for the roundabouts art project. The ribbon cutting will be at the Civic Center Park VIP Tent during the Mike the Headless Chicken Festival. The final four sculptures are tentatively scheduled to be placed in the roundabouts next Friday, and we are excited to see them!
- DOLA Grant for Mulberry Street. This week, we were awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs for future planning efforts of the Mulberry Street downtown space.
- Beer or Root beer with the City Manager. Next week, I will be hosting a Beer or Root beer with the City Manager at Suds Brothers Brewery on Tuesday, at 5:00 p.m. If there is anything that you would like to discuss, feel free to drop in/out at any time and join us.
- Town Hall with Mesa County Commissioners. As a reminder for those that may be interested in attending, the Mesa County Commissioners will be hosting a Town Hall Meeting at the Fruita Civic Center on August 24, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. City Council rescheduled the workshop that would have been that night to Tuesday, August 31. - **Community Recycling.** In July 2021, Fruita residents recycled 48 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.

- **TMDL Meeting.** Staff participated in discussion with Grand Valley Partners to discuss Stormwater Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Final Public Notice.
- *Iron Wheel.* Utilities crew completed sewer CCTV inspection of all Iron Wheel sewer lines and completed 2/3 of the Iron Wheel storm drain inspections. Anticipate finishing the remaining inspection of storm drains later in the week.
- **Collections Update.** Utilities crew jetted approximately 8,472 feet of sewer lines and hauled grease from I-70 Lift Station.
- Weeds Removal. Road Crew removed all weeds from Kokopelli Blvd. to Aspen Avenue.
 Weeds/trees were also cut down and removed at Coulson St. Bridge to provide for better line of site for traffic.
- Wastewater Update. Wastewater Treatment performed monthly maintenance on clarifier, monthly vehicle inspections, generator test, and walk-through inspections of all process equipment to ensure no equipment failure.

Avoided 132 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 28 passenger vehicles!

235,242 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 3,136 people!
