## **Tuesday's City Council Workshop**

We have two items to discuss at the workshop on Tuesday night. The first is a discussion on the general penalties for violations of the Fruita Municipal Code. The second item is to continue our discussion on housing goals and to determine next steps. See you on Tuesday night!

## Highway 6&50 Sewer Replacement Project Update

This week, work has shifted out of the highway and to the north side of Hwy 6 & 50 into parking lots for the duration of the project. Good progress has been made on the mainline. Crossings at Maple Street and Grand will occur in the next couple of weeks. There will continue to be intermittent closures of Hwy. 6 & 50 as crews prepare to tie in the lateral lines with the mainline.

Access to businesses in this area remains open and the city appreciates the community's patience while we work to complete these repairs. Please continue to slow down and use caution when traveling through this area and please support those businesses who have been impacted by this construction project. THANK YOU FRUITA!!

## **General Updates**

• **CMU Robinson Theater Briefing.** Earlier this week, Mayor Pro Tem Buck, Councilor Breman, and City Manager Mike Bennett attended a special meeting at Colorado Mesa University (CMU) regarding their efforts to seek state funding for a

- major upgrade to the CMU Robinson Theater. The goal is to make the theater a premier performing arts center on the Western Slope and they would the City of Fruita signing a letter of support for the project.
- DOLA Visit. PW Director Kimberly Bullen attended a lunch meeting with Rick Garcia, the
  Executive Director of the Co. Department of Local Affairs, to share successes in Fruita from
  DOLA funded projects. Staff also shared future funding needs Fruita has for current and longterm capital projects.
- State of the State Address. Mayor Pro Tem Buck and Planning & Development Director Dan
  Caris also attended a meeting with Governor Polis, where he shared an abbreviated version of
  his state of the state address in Grand Junction. The group also discussed economic
  development efforts for the region as a whole.
- *Transportation Mobility Hub Project.* City Engineer Sam Atkins also attended a meeting with the Governor and area leaders regarding the need for a transportation hub in our area.
- Reed Park Project Update. This week, our Parks and Recreation Director submitted a concept
  paper to Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) for the Reed Park Renovation Project. As part of the
  Resilient Communities grant through GOCO, local organizations are required to submit a
  concept paper for each project that they would like to apply for funding. We should know by the
  middle of March if we are invited to apply for the grant for this project.
- Coffee & Community Connections Event. Next Wednesday morning, Feb. 23, Mayor Kincaid will
  be a speaker at the Coffee and Community Connections event at Timberline Bank, at 8:30 a.m.
  Mayor Kincaid will be joined by Dr. Korrey Klein (CEO of Family Health West), Curtis Englehart
  (Director of the Mesa County Workforce Center), Andrea Lopez (External Affairs Manager at Ute
  Water), and Fire Chief Frank Cavalier (Lower valley Fire District).

- Wastewater Treatment Update. Wastewater Treatment staff performed their WAS tank inspection and created a preventative maintenance schedule in the work order system for annual inspection. They completed their capsule build for the river temperature project and will plan on installing this in the river soon.
