# **Highway 6&50 Sewer Replacement Project Update**

M.A. Concrete continues to make good progress on the Hwy. 6 & 50 Sewer Replacement Project. Installation of the mainline is complete; all lateral tie-ins are complete with some remaining underground work in the parking lot of Fiesta Guadalajara. Concrete is being installed and should be completed by the end of next week. Concrete is being poured today at the west entrance to Wave and Fiesta Guadalajara businesses and will require several days to cure. This will require this entrance to remain closed through the weekend. Additional work will need to be completed on Mesa St. and is dependent on the progress with the Mesa St. multifamily development. Paving is tentatively set to begin in the next 1-2 weeks. Once paving is complete, striping and thermoplastic will follow.

Please continue to use caution when driving through this area and continue to support businesses impacted by this construction project. Thank you to M.A. Construction for continuing to maintain safe practices and a safe job site.

### **General Updates**

- *City Council Workshop.* As a reminder, our regular City Council Workshop was rescheduled to the fifth Tuesday of this month, from 3/22/22 to 3/29/22.
- Mulberry Street Outdoor Space Stakeholder Meetings. On Thursday, our Planning Team and consultants for the Mulberry Street Outdoor Space study hosted three stakeholder meetings to hear from residents, downtown business owners, and Boards and Commissions members on the space. The groups discussed the temporary closures of the space, such as what worked well and what could be improved, the opportunities and constraints of the space, and more. The next step in the process is to get public feedback, follow-ups with businesses, and there will be an opportunity for in-person outreach at the Fat Tire Festival in May. Our consultant will also be posting an online survey for residents to share feedback soon. More information on the project can be found on our website here.
- *Monthly Waste Management Report.* In February 2022, Fruita residents recycled 47 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.

### **Public Works**

- PW Training. Public Works crews completed a number of training courses this week including: CDOT Flagger, Hazardous Operations, Lock-Out/Tag-Out, Confined Space Entry, Excavation/Trenching Awareness, Forklift Operations, Safe Driving Strategies and Confined Space Entry Retrieval and Rescue.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** Fleet staff completed 3 police vehicle services. The motor grader is down, and staff has sent out parts for repair. The crew also completed multiple repairs/service on the Parks department equipment.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Road Maintenance staff continue to maintain HWY 6 sewer project crossings. Weather permitting, crews will be performing controlled burns along HWY 6 on Monday. Please use caution while driving through smoky areas.
- Collections Update. Collections staff installed trash cleaners in the irrigation canal. Brownshill
  completed electrical work at a lift station due to control failures. 36 utility locates were
  completed.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Cummins performed maintenance to the WWRF generator, they replaced a bad controller board, and the generator is now up and running. Staff performed routine maintenance on clarifiers and pumps. Operators are also performing power swap exercises for successful transitions.
- PW Admin Update. Participated in a conference call with Natural Resource Conservation Service regarding the Public Law-566 Program which may be an option to assist with Mountain Water properties and required improvements. Met with Colorado Department of Homeland Security Emergency Management to discuss their funding programs. Advertisements have been
