## **Street Repaying Project**

Beginning next Thursday, June 2, the community can expect to see road repaving on the streets listed below. Partial road closures will occur on June 2 and 3 while full road closures will occur on June 12 and 13. In between these dates, roads will be fully open, but users can expect the roads to be bumpy. The following streets will be affected: W. Ottley Ave. From Highway 6 to the Co-Op Country Entrance; Mesa St. From Ottley Ave. To the north end of the bridge on Ottley Ave.; Cherry St. To Mesa St.; and Pabor Ave. From Coulson St. To Cherry St. Project timelines may change depending on the weather. ## **Public Works**

• General Update. Building Maintenance completed a roof repair for a pump. Road Maintenance staff shut off all safe route signs. They also continued to help the chip seal crew with getting gravel swept up. The FOG coating was completed on 5/26. The crew will be replacing thermal plastics for multiple crosswalks and stop bars that were covered by the chip seal soon. Fleet maintenance performed maintenance on the skid steer and did some troubleshooting on some of the trucks. The Utilities department turned water on to Glade Parks users. They responded to 17 irrigation calls and 45 utility locates were completed.

- Admin Update. The Public Works Director and staff completed a tour of the Mountain Water properties and presented the city's grant presentation along with the City Manager to the Colorado Department of Local Affairs for the H2S Mitigation project.
- Irrigation Water Update. The city is experiencing some irrigation issues due to the muddy water in the system. Those at the end of irrigation lines may experience a lack of water due to mud in the line. The city is flushing, cleaning sump pits, and cleaning headgates on a regular basis to help keep the lines clean. If you are experiencing these problems and are part of an HOA please contact your HOA. Residents who are on city irrigation water are asked to clean filters more often to help keep water flowing.

## 609 Mature Trees

Represents enough saved timber resources to produce 10,355,600 sheets of printing and copy paper!

## 112 Cubic Yards of Landfill Airspace

Enough airspace to fulfill the annual municipal waste disposal needs for 143 people!

## 96,385 Kw-Hrs of Electricity

Enough power to fulfill the annual electricity needs of 9 homes!

## Avoided 108 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 23 passenger vehicles!

## 207,980 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 2,773 people!
