Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with proclaiming August 1-7, 2022, as Interfaith Awareness Week in the City of Fruita. After that, the Council will consider several items on the consent agenda and then move on to public hearings. We have five public hearings on the agenda, including a liquor license application, two planning and development items, and the second reading of the Franchise Agreements with Xcel Energy and Grand Valley Power. Following our public hearings, we have a presentation from the City's auditing firm on their report on the 2021 Financial Statements and one from Chief Krouse regarding the opioid settlement funds. Weekly FAQ


In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. If you have any questions you think would be valuable for us to share, let us know by emailing communications@fruita.org.

- Question: Do city parks close at night?
- Answer: Yes, all Fruita city parks are open from 6 a.m. 11 p.m. except for Snooks
 Bottom which is open from 8 a.m. 10 p.m. City parks have hours of operation to keep
 the community safe. All park usage areas including bathrooms and gates are unlocked
 by 8 a.m. and locked by 11 p.m. Other rules of city parks include no overnight parking,
 no smoking, no alcohol or glass containers, picking up after yourself, and keeping dogs
 on leash.

General Updates

- Financial Reports. The financial reports for tax revenues received in May of 2022 are now available and can be found in this week's Council packet. When compared to the previous year, City sales tax collections in May increased 5%, and is trending at a 6% increase for the year. Additionally, use tax collections on motor vehicles (up 29% in May 2022, year-to-date, trending at 15% when compared to 2021), building materials (up 96% in May, year-to-date, seeing a 58% increase), and the county sales tax (up 10% in May, trending at 9% year-to-date) all had increases when compared to the 2021. After a decrease in April, the lodging tax rebounded and was up 43% in May of 2022 and is at an 18% increase when compared to 2021.
- City Engagement Events. Last Tuesday, Councilor Amy Miller, myself, and staff engaged with community members at Aspen Street Coffee. We answered questions and talked about transparency, code enforcement, and City Council. These events are a great way for us to meet community members and answer their questions. Our next event is with Mayor Kincaid on July 26, 4:00 p.m. at Enstrom Candies! - **Partner Coordination Meetings.** I enjoyed meeting with a few partners this week including the School District, Housing Resources and the Business Incubator (FWorks). Appreciate each of their partnerships and support.
- IIJA Summit. On Monday, Public Works Director Kimberly Bullen and Assistant to the City Manager Shannon Vassen attended a full day summit provided by the state on the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act ("IIJA"). The State is beginning to implement many of the IIJA programs in Colorado, and this was an opportunity for staff to learn more about potential funding sources for city capital projects. Out of the 200 IIJA programs applicable to Colorado, 70 of those are available to local governments. Programs available to local governments, and that are relevant to Fruita, include potential funding for broadband, roads and bridges, water and water treatment, safety, and more. As an organization, we will continue to learn more about all of the programs available through IIJA, and if any are good fits for our priority projects.
- **Budget Meetings.** Throughout this week, staff and I had the opportunity to meet with almost every city department to discuss needs, challenges, opportunities, and priorities for the 2023 budget. As a leadership team, we have also been discussing and prioritizing capital projects for

- next year. We look forward to sharing a lot of the information that we received throughout these meetings with the Council at the planning retreat and look forward to hearing from the Council on these and other priorities.
- Presentation to Co. Riverfront Trail Hosts. Thursday evening, members of the Livability
 Commission and staff presented an overview of the Adopt a Street/Trail program to the
 Colorado Riverfront Trail Hosts. After the meeting, we received our first application for a group
 to participate in the program. Thank you to the Trail Hosts for allowing us to present at their
 meeting, we are excited to get the program up and running.
- Colorado Tourism Office 2021 Travel Research. The Colorado Tourism Office (CTO) shared their 2021 travel research results. Overall, visitation to Colorado increased with 84.2 million trips which is up 13.6% compared to 2020. The majority of visits are coming from leisure travelers while business, group, convention, and international still struggle to recover from the pandemic. The below image shows overall travel spend for different Colorado regions. The Mountains and Mesa's (including Fruita) not only recovered from the pandemic but saw an increase in travel spending in 2021 compared to 2019.
