Tuesday's City Council Workshop

Pine Street Bridge Closure Happening this Fall

A full road closure of Pine Street north of K.4 Road and south of K.6 Road is scheduled to begin on October 3, 2022. This road closure will facilitate the utility relocation work during October in support of the Pine Street Bridge Reconstruction Project at the Little Salt Wash bridge crossing. GA Western is scheduled to begin work on the bridge reconstruction on October 31, 2022. The full road closure is expected to last through May of 2023. The City of Fruita Engineering Department requests that all citizens respect the full road closure as hazardous conditions may exist within the construction area and will be intermittent during the utility relocation portion of the project.

- Question: What are the community's core values & how does the city utilize these values?
- Answer: In 2019, over 4,000 residents participated in the Fruita in Motion Comprehensive Plan process. The plan outlines a vision, goals, policies, and action for the City of Fruita. Through this process, a list of community values emerged. A few of these values include, that residents love living in Fruita, love its small-town feel, and they want to preserve these values far into the future. These values are at the core of the city's vision, goals, and policies not only throughout the Fruita in Motion Comprehensive Plan but throughout every project and service, the city provides to the community.

The following vision was created for the city based on the community values.

"The City of Fruita values quality of place. It's an inclusive city, with a small-town feel and vibrant downtown, surrounded by public lands. People love to live, work, and play in Fruita because the City facilitates community, safe neighborhoods, family-friendly events, and walking and biking. General Updates

- Regional Roadmaps Recovery Economic Development Partnership. This week we held an
 update with all 17 partners and state agencies on this process. Economic Planning Solutions
 (EPS) presented data for discussion focused on two areas: transportation and manufacturing.
 EPS also conducted site visits and meetings with the communities and will be preparing a first
 draft report to the group to be reviewed in late August.
- Colorado Housing & Finance Authority Open House. I joined colleagues in the valley for an open house with CHFA this week delivering updates and needs facing our housing challenges and strategies.
- **OPIOID Settlement.** Following Council direction Tuesday night, we have officially opted out and redirected the City opioid settlement funds to the region to be governed by the goals and direction of the regional board that Chief Krouse is a voting member of.
- Mobile Mesa County July Newsletter. The July edition of the Mobile Mesa County newsletter is now available and can be found here. It includes updates on Grand Valley Transit in preparation of Back to School, current GVT Promotions, and information on a Community Open House for the Regional Transporation Office, on the first amendment to the 2045 Regional Transporation Plan.
- Fruita and Palisade Tourism Partnership Selected to Participate in Reimagine Destinations Program. To continue work on the "Bookends of the Grand Valley" marketing partnership between the Town of Palisade and the City of Fruita, we were recently selected to participate in the Reimagine Destinations grant program with the Colorado Tourism Office. This program provides 100 hours of consulting work for the partnership over the next year to finalize key marketing projects. Also, through this program, the Colorado Tourism Office is providing \$20,000 worth of photo and video assets that can be used for marketing purposes. We are excited to continue work with this partnership as it has been a success and look forward to technical assistance and expertise from the Colorado Tourism Office.
- **FWorks co-working desk space available.** The FWorks co-working space is located on the second floor of the Civic Center and has dedicated desk space available for anyone looking for a work location. Interested workers can visit the FWorks website here.
