This week, the Downtown Advisory Board is hosting two meetings at the Cavalcade to discuss how to utilize the many talents and connections downtown businesses have to engage with the community and drive more Fruita residents to the downtown area. The meetings focus on what a "locals day/night" would look like and how it would affect downtown businesses. The first meeting was held on Tuesday, October 4 and the second meeting is this Sunday, October 9 at 1:00 p.m. at the Cavalcade.

Engineering

• **Pine Street Bridge Update.** Xcel Distribution Gas completed the work to disconnect the gas main across the bridge. Xcel power located the existing irrigation main adjacent to the power poles that require relocation. Anticipated work for next week consists of Ute Water installing valves on their water main and disconnecting the pipeline across the bridge. Xcel Power will continue work to ensure power to all residents and removal of the Primary Power lines across the Little Salt Wash to facilitate the bridge construction.

Public Works

- *Fleet Maintenance Update.* Multiple small repairs, parts replacements, and inspections were made to Police vehicles, Parks mowers and Public Works vehicles and equipment.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** The crew installed parking signs downtown, crack sealed streets and mowed City rights-of-way areas.
- **Utilities Update.** Jetting and cleaning sewer lines have continued. Silt was cleaned out of all Encanto irrigation headgates. 25 utility locates were performed. Road maintenance and Wastewater staff attended a 2-day Western Colorado Water & Wastewater conference.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. The Lower Valley Fire Department performed a controlled burn at the Treatment plant. All HVAC units were winterized.
- Admin Update. The Public Works Director participated in the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Per- and poly- Fluoroalkyl (PFAS) & Biosolids Stakeholder Workgroup regarding required sampling under Regulation 64. Participated in the Small Cities/Rural Communities webinar on succession planning in Public Works. Attended the Colorado Municipal League Water Law 101 webinar.

CITY OF FRUITA SEPTEMBER 2022 RECYCLING BENEFITS

48 tons of bottles, cans, paper and cardboard were recycled by the community this month.

This month's recycling efforts saved the following resources:

767 Mature Trees

Represents enough saved timber resources to produce 13,047,000 sheets of printing and copy paper!

111 Cubic Yards of Landfill Airspace

Enough airspace to fulfill the annual municipal waste disposal needs for 141 people!

110,531 Kw-Hrs of Electricity

Enough power to fulfill the annual electricity needs of 10 homes!

Avoided 131 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 28 passenger vehicles!

233,720 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 3,116 people!
