The Civic Center is closed to the public today Friday, September 22, 2023, for set up of the Fruita Fall Festival. Administration and Planning will still be available by phone.

## **Tuesday's City Council Workshop**

We have two items of discussion for our Workshop on Tuesday night. The first is an overview of the 2024 City Manager's Recommended Budget. We will spend some time covering the highlights of the budget, and most of that information can be found in the introduction and transmittal letter of the budget. ## Fruita Fall Festival Kicks off Tonight!

The 108<sup>th</sup> Annual Fruita Fall Festival starts today at 3 p.m. The festival runs through Saturday evening. You can view the entire festival schedule on the <u>Fruita Fall Festival</u> website.

## Changes to Trash and Recycling Services Begin in 2024

Starting in January 2024, all Fruita households will be transitioned to an automated collection system. We realize this change in service will be an adjustment for residents, so we've worked with WM to provide as many options as possible to help meet the needs of the community. With this, we want to say thank you to all the residents who were part of the initial rollout of service. Your feedback has been extremely valuable and was used to help with the rest of the transition. The full transition will provide more options to residents, including additional services throughout the year. Also, starting in 2024, recycling will become much easier with a single-stream recycling service. Instead of having multiple bins for recycling, residents will receive one 96-gallon container that all recyclables can be placed in. Materials being recycled will no longer need to be separated and sorted.

#### What to Expect

You will receive more information from WM in the mail over the next few months.

- WM will deliver a 96-gallon trash can and recycling cart (optional) in December 2023.
- You will also have the option of receiving an additional trash can, at a reduced rate of \$4 per can/per month.
- Information on how to dispose of old trash cans or recycling bins will be provided by WM. We thank you for your time and patience as this new program starts at the beginning of the year.

## Weekly FAQ

- **Question**: My sidewalk is in poor condition. Can the City of Fruita help me replace the sidewalk in front of my house?
- Answer: Yes, with the City of Fruita's Sidewalk Replacement Program, the City of Fruita helps residents with managing the project construction and the cost of improvements. The city will pay 80% of the total cost and the property owner pays 20% of the cost. The city maintains a sidewalk condition inventory and replacements for each year are identified based on the inventory. Crews are currently working on 2023 sidewalk replacements. ## **General Updates**

- Draft 2024 Budget Available Online. The first draft of the 2024 Budget is included in the packet
  this week and can also be found at our website here: <u>City Manager's Recommended 2024</u>
  Budget.
- Regional Broadband Meeting. On Thursday morning, Shannon and I attended a regional broadband meeting hosted by the Co. Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) and Region 10. The meeting was well attended and included staff from all of the communities implementing broadband projects between Glenwood Springs and Fruita. Region 10 provided an update on the overall project and then each jurisdiction provided an individual update. Work on our middle-mile broadband project is progressing well, as the Carrier-Neutral location has been built and we are just waiting for concrete to be poured before placing the building. Work on the lateral will begin soon and should be complete by the end of the year. After that, it is a matter of obtaining the optical equipment and executing the lease and then our project will be mostly complete. Thank you to our partners at DOLA for hosting the meeting! It was great to hear from the other communities and updates on the project.
- GOCO Community Dinner. Marc Mancuso and I attended the regional Great Outdoors Colorado regional dinner last night and enjoyed catching up with GOCO staff, board members and regional partners.
- **CDOT US 6 & 50 Construction.** CDOT continues work on US 6 & 50 on the railroad crossing. There will continue to be a full closure of the railroad crossing. 20 Road is also restricted to a right turn in and right turn out only. Recommended detour routes are 19 Road (north) to J Road (east) to 22 Road (south). See updates from CDOT on the project website.
- Waste Management Monthly Report. In August, Fruita residents recycled 53 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Year-to-date, the community is exceeding its recycling goal by over 15 tons great job Fruita! The full report can be found below.
- 169 South Mulberry Purchase. We officially closed on this property Thursday.

## **Engineering**

- Reed Park Bid is Open. The City of Fruita will be taking bids for the Reed Park project until Friday, October 13, 2023.
- **Sidewalk Replacement Project.** Work continues for the 2023 sidewalk replacement project. Crews will be working this weekend on a portion of sidewalk in front of the Fruita Middle School. Work should be done by Monday before school is back in session on Tuesday.
- *Upcoming Road Closure.* The Kismet Minor Subdivision will begin work on Mesa Street on October 2, 2023. The work will necessitate the full closure of Mesa Street between Ottley

Avenue and the bridge at Little Salt Wash. The contractor will place signs next week to inform the public of the upcoming road closure. The work should be completed within 10 days of the road closure.

#### **Parks and Recreation**

Maintenance Week. Thanks to all of the Staff that helped with maintenance at the FCC. Starting
Sunday evening September 17, all full-time staff, and a plethora of part-time staff helped clean
and perform maintenance on the facility. The facility had a new diving board, gym curtain, and
outdoor pool cover installed during the closure. Parks crews assisted with hauling away the old
diving board and grounds maintenance outside of the facility.





- Fall Festival Set Up. Parks crews have been working with the Fruita Chamber and contractors to
  get festival fencing, electrical boxes, and additional trashcans set up for the festival this
  weekend.
- **Movie in the Park recap.** The Super Mario Bros Movie that was held last week was a huge success, filling Civic Center Park with grateful families. We are excited to host Back to the Future on October 6<sup>th</sup> for the final Movie in the park of the year.
- Tree Trimming at Civic Center Prior to Fruita Fall Festival. Parks crews noticed some large limbs
  hanging in the trees above Civic Center Park and had them removed prior to the festival
  eliminating the hazard.

#### **Public Works**

- **Utility Update.** Utilities staff assisted with hydro-excavating for the H2S Manhole Replacement Project. Staff continue with irrigation calls and routine headgate checks, utility locating and continued sewer collection lines cleaning.
- Chip Sealing Project. Annual Chip Seal/Fog coating has been completed except for the area where contractors are working on Ottley between Maple St. to North Sycamore Street. The City would like to thank Mesa County Road and Bridge for their partnership with chip sealing this year. It is greatly appreciated.
- **Street Striping.** Annual Street Striping is completed. A total of 197,418 feet of yellow striping was completed and 123,127 feet of white striping was completed for a total of 320,545 feet.
- **Pavement Assessment Project.** The City received the sidewalk, curb and gutter, and sign data and will be reviewing the information as we continue to move forward with the overall project.
- **Progress Update H2S/Biofilter Project.** The contractor has fully mobilized to the site; excavation of existing manholes #2-14 has been completed. Bypass equipment from manhole #6 to the headworks influent, including the road crossings at the United Companies entrance and County Road 15 is in place and operating. Excavation crews have staged manholes #1-12 in preparation for the full replacement. The contractor has set manhole #1 and is working to set manhole #1A.





• **Progress Update Aeration Equipment Replacement Project.** Access stairway into oxidation ditch #1 has been installed by the contractor. Existing diffusers have been removed from the oxidation ditch.

#### 123,091 kWh of Electricity

Enough power to fulfill the annual electricity needs of 11 homes!

## Avoided 146 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 31 passenger vehicles!

#### 260,278 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 3,470 people!
