
Tuesday's City Council Workshop

We have two regular agenda items and two proclamations requests to discuss at our workshop on Tuesday. Boards and Commissions Mixer Event Next Wednesday

Fog Coating (part of the Chip Seal Project) Starting Next Week

Chip sealing operations are now complete, and crews will begin the next step in the project. Starting Monday, August 21, 2023, crews will begin the fog coating process to finish the project. Crews will begin on the north side of Fruita and is expected to take a week to complete before moving to the south side of Fruita. The fog coat sealant takes about few hours to dry, and drivers need to take caution when driving on the roads to reduce the risk of tracking oil.

- **Question**: When is the E-Waste Recycling event?
- **Answer:** The annual e-waste recycling event is happening on Saturday, October 7 from 9 a.m. 1 p.m. at the Fruita Civic Center parking lot. Fruita residents can drop-off old electronics they want to dispose of. <u>Please visit the event webpage for details on what items can be dropped off.</u>

General Updates

- Coffee Club with Janie Van Winkle. I attended this event this morning and appreciate Janie educating us on the successes and challenges of the cattle industry. I learned a lot and hope we can find ways to better support the industry.
- Draft 2023 Mesa County Wildlife Protection Plan. Mesa County released the Draft 2023
 Community Wildfire Protection Plan. Residents can see if their home or community is at risk of a wildfire. Mesa County is also seeking community input on the plan and are taking comments until August 27, 2023. View the plan online.
- Waste Management Monthly Report. In July, Fruita residents recycled 48 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Year-to-date, have recycled 366 tons of materials, and we are on track to beat our recycling goal for the year. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.
- **Discover Fruita Radio Show.** On this month's episode of Discover Fruita, Assistant City Manager Shannon Vassen shared about Fruita's tourism marketing efforts, including marketing strategies, the use of lodging tax, why visitors travel to Fruita, and more. The episode will be available online at bit.ly/discoverfruita in the next week.

- **Co2uT Economic Impact.** Co2uT is a gravel biking race that happens each year in Fruita, CO. The race is hosted by Desert Gravel, and this year's race which took place on May 14, 2023, had an economic impact of \$633,800. In total, there were 1,077 participants and 4,225 night stays associated with the festival with 19% of participants staying in a Fruita hotel, 16% staying in a Grand Junction hotel, 21% staying in a Fruita short-term rental, 7.5% staying in a Grand Junction short-term rental, and 9.5% camping.
- Meeting with GJEP. This morning, I had the opportunity to meet with the Executive Director of
 the Grand Junction Economic Partnership ("GJEP"), to discuss our partnership with GJEP and our
 agreement with the organization. One of our Economic Development goals this year is to either
 create or update our memorandums of understanding with our economic development partners
 to clarify roles, align goals, and to manage expectations. I will be meeting with all our partner
 agencies this month and next to work on this. Also, we will have each of these partners present
 to the City Council throughout the month of September.
- Fall 2023 City Link. The next City Link edition is being finalized and will be sent to the printer
 next week. Fruita residents can expect to receive the newsletter in their mailbox in early
 September.

Engineering

• *Pine Street Bridge Update.* Mays Construction mobilized to the site on Tuesday and began work on the curb, gutter, and sidewalks (C, G, & SW). The work by Mays Construction ties all the existing C, G & SW along Pine Street into the new bridge. There remains one portion to complete on the southwest corner of the project which was left out to ensure access to the residents in that area. Mays Construction intends to complete the last of the C, G & SW next Monday. GA Western will re-mobilize to the site next week to prepare the bridge deck by sandblasting the surface and then applying the epoxy coating to the bridge deck.

- **Fiber Installation Update.** Public Works staff meets weekly with representatives from Deeply Digital regarding the installation of conduit for fiber throughout the community. 48 tons of bottles, cans, paper and cardboard were recycled by the community this month.

769 Mature Trees

Represents enough saved timber resources to produce 13,071,700 sheets of printing and copy paper!

111 Cubic Yards of Landfill Airspace

Enough airspace to fulfill the annual municipal waste disposal needs for 141 people!

110,740 kWh of Electricity

Enough power to fulfill the annual electricity needs of 10 homes!

Avoided 131 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 28 passenger vehicles!

234,162 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 3,122 people!
