# **Tuesday's City Council Workshop**

We have three items on the agenda for our workshop next Tuesday. The meeting will begin with a presentation from the Executive Director of United Way on 211 and an overview of non-profit services that are available to residents of Mesa County. We will then move on to a discussion on the Mountain Water Properties. Finally, our meeting will conclude with starting our discussion on Boards and Commissions for Fruita, and any other items.

#### **ArborWorks Schedule for Next Week**

Xcel Energy, working with ArborWorks, a utility line clearance company, began trimming trees in Fruita. They will be trimming all trees, both private and public, if the tree is a hazard for powerlines. They will not be working in Fruita next week. We will provide more information in future updates on where and when ArborWorks will continue to work in Fruita.

# **General Updates**

- Monthly Waste Management Report. In January this year, Fruita residents recycled 59 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. The full monthly report from Waste Mangement can be found below.
- **Coffee with the City Manager this Morning.** Thank you to everyone who joined us this morning at Aspen Street Coffee! The Fruita Police Chief, Assistant City Manager, and I were able to answer questions from community members regarding affordable housing and homelessness. We also discussed current city projects, water usage, and more.



• Career Day at Central High School. Thursday morning, staff participated in the Career Fair at Central High School to share career opportunities in the Public Works and Parks and Recreation industries. It was great to connect with students and share with them the various job paths local government provides.




#### **Administration**

- Increased Utility Costs. City departments are seeing substantial increases in utility costs due to
  price adjustments from utility providers. January bills for natural gas for the Fruita Community
  Center and the Wastewater Reclamation Facility saw significant increases compared to prior
  years.
- **Blood Drive Recap.** On Tuesday, the Civic Center hosted a Blood Drive with Vitalant. The Blood Drive received 17 donations, which will help an estimated 42 people. Thank you for helping save lives!

#### **Engineering**

• N. Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza Update. The southern two parking spots were installed this week, as were more decorative lighting foundations and underground electrical improvements. More concrete work is expected to occur later this week and next week, depending on the weather. Please note, due to the demolition work that has begun on the east side of Mulberry, the pedestrian route from Aspen Ave. to businesses north of the project has changed. Pedestrians are asked to please use an alternate route such as the sidewalk on the south side of Aspen Ave. to get from Aspen St. to the north side of the project. Crosswalks across Aspen Ave. are available at Peach St. (east of the project) or at the east side of the circle (west of the project). Pedestrians can access businesses on Mulberry St. north of the project (the Hot Tomato, Base Camp, the Copper Club, and the Vintage Common) from the east via the alley between Peach St. and Mulberry St. or from the north via Pabor Ave. Access to the Cavalcade and Suds Brothers is still available from Aspen Ave. We thank you for your patience as we complete these improvements.



- Pine Street Bridge Update. Work began on the bridge deck and top portion of the abutments by
  setting forms and reinforcing steel for both the north and south abutments. Work also began on
  the permanent steel deck forms that span the area between the concrete girders. GA Western
  anticipates placing the concrete for the bridge deck on March 9 depending on weather and work
  conditions.
- Broadband RFP. The Requests for Proposals ("RFP") for the City's Middle-Mile Broadband and Carrier Neutral Location project went out this week. The City will be accepting proposals until Friday, March 17, 2023, at 1:30 p.m. The RFP can be found at this link.

# **Parks and Recreation**

• Update on the recent FCC aquatic closures. The Fruita Community Center has just installed new chemical feeders for the pools and hot tub. This system will be safer, cleaner and more efficient for our staff moving forward. However, it has been difficult to find the perfect point at which chemicals will balance providing a safe body of water. At this time, our staff is working hard to adjust to the new system. In the old system, a pump with a small motor helped balance chemicals and pushed the right amount of chemicals into the pool and hot tub. The new system uses an erosion method to melt chemicals and a big motor to push the right amount of chemicals into the pools. The system can become airlocked which imbalances the chemicals, but staff are working hard to find the right balance of air to prevent this from happening.

- 1<sup>st</sup> Biggest Change Challenge completed. Our fitness department offered a new program this year for participants to meet fitness goals. This program had 14 participants with an average change of 1". Participants had nutrition and fitness coaching from Tracy, Krista, and Lindsey each week and had great feedback. We hope to have future Biggest Change challenges in the fall season.
- Gym Floor Installation at the Fruita Community Center. The flooring has been nailed down in place and sanding has begun. Once sanding is complete, the floor will be prepared for sealer coats. During the application of sealer coats, the track will be closed to patron use. The expected days of this track closure are February 23 and 24. The timeline for completion and opening of our basketball court is early March.
- Night at the FCC March 3 cancelled. This date was cancelled to allow for the completion of the basketball court flooring. The next night at the FCC is May 12, 2023. This event is for 5<sup>th</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> graders to enjoy the Fruita Community Center all to themselves. Entry is \$10 per student and parent sign in/out required.
- Mark your calendars for our fitness Speaker Series on March 9. Ashley Anderson, M.A., LPCC, will be offering a session on tolerating and reducing stress in our daily lives. Session available at the Fruita Community Center on March 9 at 2:00 pm. No pre-registration required.
- Spring Break Lifeguard Training Open for registration. Lifeguard Training Blended Learning course will be offered March 23-25, 8am-5pm at the Fruita Community Center. Participants must be 15 years old on the first day of class and be able to pass a prerequisite skills test as well as complete the online module of class. Registration available until March 16 for aspiring lifeguards!
