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Introduction

The purpose of the City of Fruita Strategic Plan is to outline City Council priorities staff will work to achieve over the next 2-4 years in addition to core service delivery. The plan's priorities are aligned with the City's values including the City's long-term planning documents beginning with the City's 10-year comprehensive plan [Fruita in Motion](#), subsequent [master plans](#), and [community survey results](#) conducted every four years. *Years and deadlines subject to change based on capacity, resources, or opportunities.*

The Strategic Plan is updated every two years following the Municipal election occurring in April of even years. After reviewing the City's values, community survey results, progress of goals in the comprehensive and master plans, and current and future community needs, City Council determines what short-term priorities and/or projects will help to achieve these long-term planning efforts.

The Strategic Plan serves as a guide for City Council and staff in the creation of the Annual City Budget adopted every December for the following calendar year. The [Annual Budget](#) prioritizes operational action items by service delivery area and capital projects. Specific operational goals and performance measures are identified in the budget per each service area.

The Strategic Plan also serves as a tool to track the progress of each project and priority. City staff will update the Strategic Plan each quarter with progress notes for each goal.

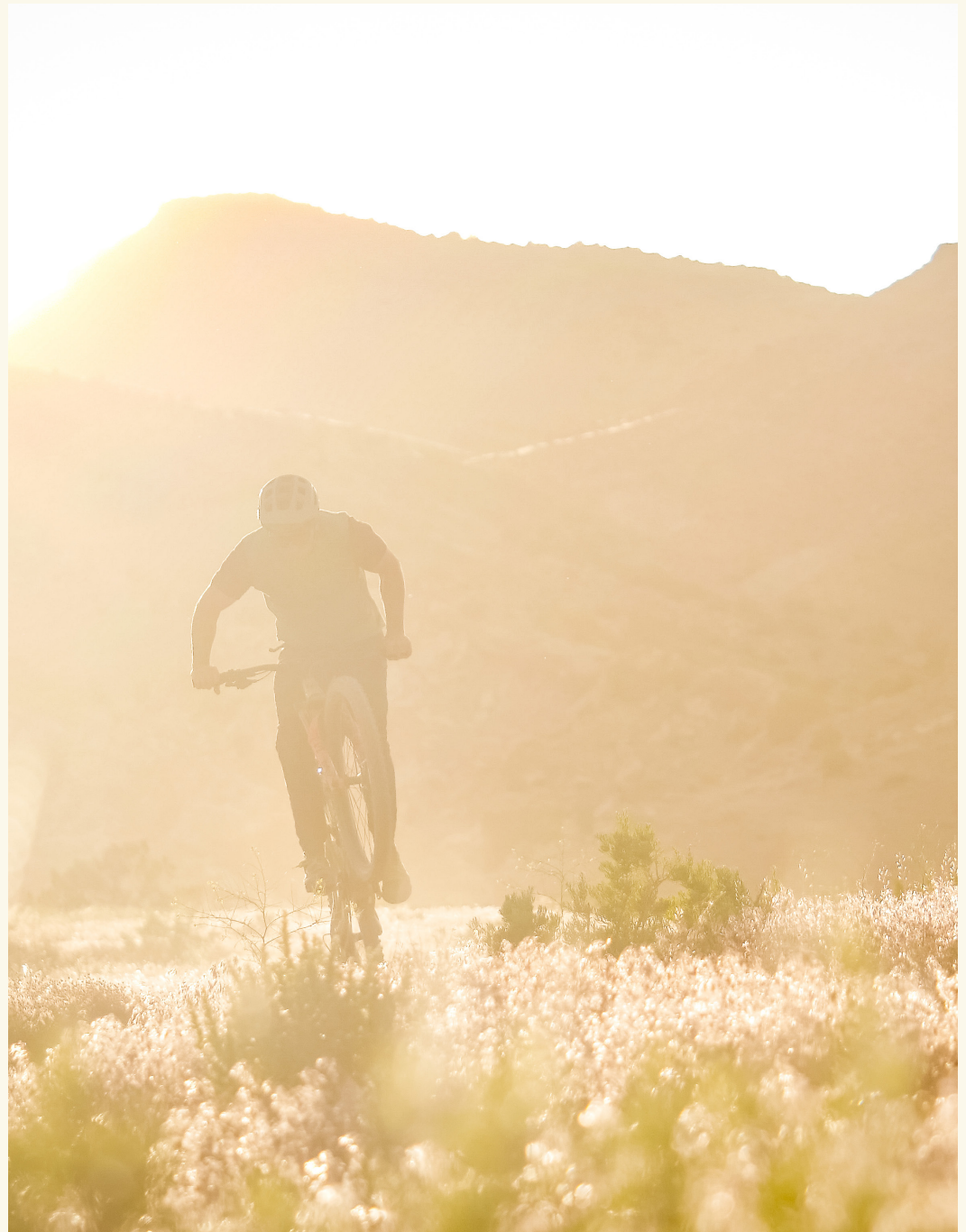

The City strives to be a bike and pedestrian friendly community by providing a system of sidewalks, trails, and bike lanes that connect our parks, schools, neighborhoods, civic facilities, and commercial areas. We are an inclusive community of doers who enjoy active and healthy lifestyles.

The last survey was completed in 2021 with over 4,000 residents participating in the survey. The following community priorities emerged from the survey.

- Improve the quality of representation you receive from City Council.
- Improve effectiveness of City communications.

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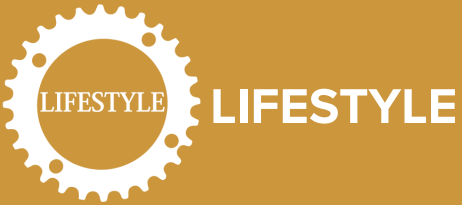
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2022 PRIORITIES



Bike Park Improvements

Working with Singletrack Trails, the Fruita Bike Park will go under a renovation. Given the amount of use, there has been wear to some of the features as well as erosion from weather. The renovation will provide more durable and longer lasting elements, improvements to the skill area, installation of 21 metal/wood jumps, and installation of 2-3 showroom demos.

Pine Street Bridge Replacement

The reconstruction of the bridge will consist of a full replacement and necessary safety enhancements by widening the bridge to three lanes, installing a curb, gutters, and a five-foot wide sidewalk on each side of the bridge.

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations at the Fruita Civic Center

In the spring of 2022, the City of Fruita was awarded a grant from the Colorado Department of Transportation to install two fast charging electric vehicle charging stations in the Fruita Civic Center parking lot. Working with Excel Energy, these stations will be installed in 2023.

Middle Mile Broadband

In 2022, the City of Fruita was awarded a grant from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs to fund the construction needed to bring symmetrical Giga bite internet speed to Fruita. The City of Fruita will install fiber from Grand Junction to Fruita to bring faster speeds and redundancy to Fruita. Once the project is complete, existing and new internet providers can use the fiber to provide new services to Fruita residents and to support their operations.

North Mulberry Street Outdoor Space Project

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Fruita closed down North Mulberry Street to provide outdoor seating for Downtown Fruita businesses. After high utilization, the City received a grant from the Department of Local Affairs to create a design for a permanent gathering space. After community engagement and design, the space will go under construction to implement a permanent gathering space, in the form of a downtown plaza.

Reed Park Improvements

Reed Park is aged and over the years, the community has shown support in renovating the space. Improvements identified in the Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space, and Trails Master Plan include, updates to gathering spaces, open turf, a new skate park, basketball courts, and parking. Proposed renovations to Reed Park will include replacing the existing restroom and shelter structure, replacing the playground, electrical upgrades for special events, and installation of a MiniPitch that will include basketball, soccer, and pickleball lines.

Create a Dog Park at the property by the Dinosaur Journey Museum

The City of Fruita owns a empty lot south of the Dinosaur Journey Museum. Based on community feedback in the Parks, Health, Reaction, Open Space, and Trails Master Plan, a Dog Park was identified as an important project to add to Fruita’s Parks and Recreation system. Based on City Council direction, the lot will be transformed into a native dog park with public parking in the Dinosaur Journey Museum public parking lot.

19 Road Design, Right-of-Way Acquisition, and Construction

19 Road is identified as a major arterial roadway in the City’s Circulation Plan. To keep up with development in the City’s planned future growth boundary along 19 Road, the road will be widened to a three lane section with turn lanes from J Road to Highway 6 & 50 as a transitional step towards its future classification.

South Mesa Street Improvements

This project is the second phase in the Downtown Fruita Streetscape Improvement Plan. In 2022, the City of Fruita was awarded a grant from the Colorado Department of Transportation. Improvements will include on-street diagonal parking, increase parking spots, consolidate access drives, adding planting islands, ensuring continuous sidewalks, and replacing 600 feet of sewer lines. Previous grants from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs assisted in paying for Downtown Fruita Streetscape Improvement Plan and design of the South Mesa Street improvements.

Maple Street Bridge Replacement

The Maple Street Bridge is functionally obsolete and has been slated for replacement. The replacement will bring the bridge up to City standards. The current bridge is 22 feet wide with very narrow sidewalks. The replacement will widen the bridge to 44 feet with sidewalks, curbs, and gutters. In addition, the replacement will include provisions for future expansion of the Little Salt Wash Trail.

Mountain Properties

The City of Fruita owns three reservoirs near Glade Park, CO. The City of Fruita maintains the water rights of these reservoirs. Fruita Reservoir #2 is currently on a “No Fill Order” by the State of Colorado Division of Water Resources. The City of Fruita’s goal is to repair Fruita Reservoir #2, removing the “No Fill” order by the State of Colorado Division of Water Resources to allow water storage in the reservoir. By repairing the reservoir, water storage volume and water quality would increase. The repair would provide improved delivery of water for agriculture water management, water quality management, and public recreation.
